This is the first year of the project.

Project Description/Justification:**Project Description:**

This request leverages purchase and startup costs for a downtown Anchorage facility providing secure, safe, affordable housing for homeless and very-low-income people and families who have no place to stay and cannot afford apartments. After July 1, 2002, the project will be self-supporting through operating income. Units will be available exclusively for referred clients of at least 40 local service providers, 75% of which serve those with mental disabilities. It is projected that there will be a potential project target population of at least 1,200 people, with 25% to 35% of these experiencing mental disabilities and many lacking independent living skills. Units will be private, self-contained, and fully furnished with phones, refrigerators, microwaves, and full bathrooms. Guests and their providers together decide lengths of stay; the project will not set minimum or maximum stays. Although project staff will not provide services on site, guests must be referred by agencies that are providing them with services during their stay. Agencies will execute agreements with the project outlining referral terms and will help develop project operating policies to ensure that client needs are addressed. A full-time trained staff will ensure that guests benefit from their stays and that house rules are enforced.

Results: A Shared Vision II objectives in Adult Services concerning gaps in continuity of care, homelessness, housing, and decriminalizing mental illness.

Indicators: guests, agencies, neighbors, and community partners satisfaction

Performance Measures: total numbers of guests (with demographics), bed nights, referrals (by source), and participating agencies; average length of stay.
