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# **Component: Kuskokwim Campus**

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### **Component Mission**

The Kuskokwim Campus of the University of Alaska Fairbanks prepares professional, community, and cultural leaders in an active and relevant learning environment.

Vision: Elitnauraput cikiumalartut puqigmek wangkuta-llu ellaitnek elicesquelluta. [Our students are given wisdom to learn so that we can also learn through them.]

# **Component Services Provided**

The Kuskokwim Campus (KuC) offers on-campus and distance-delivered courses, serving an area encompassing 75,000 square miles (about the size of Pennsylvania) of coastal wetlands, tundra, and mountains, bordering 250 miles of the Bering Sea. The campus offers a full complement of College of Rural Alaska (CRA) and UAF certificate, A.A.S., A.A., B.A. and master degree programs. It has the only rural residential dorm program. Other programs include the emerging scholars program, regional adult basic education center, workplace basics program, continuing education program and career pathways program.

### Key Component Issues for FY2003 – 2004

#### Unity in promoting communication and collaboration

The first priority of KuC is to provide academic credentials. The campus promotes and links to university academic programs and develops specialized vocational and academic programs as necessary to meet individual employment needs.

KuC as part of CRA and the UAF has developed and implemented an emerging scholars program, a 24-to-30 month program for college students in the 18-to-24 year old age group. It is a multi-level 60-to-75-credit course sequence, emphasizing competency-based learning in a residential campus setting. Student-centered and integrated instruction links learning to the development of individual, social, and academic skills needed to complete certificate or degree programs to be successful in the community, workplace, and life.

The campus will help maintain and preserve the language and culture of the Yup'ik and Cup'ik Eskimo in the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta.

The community and continuing education program will provide quality non-credit and continuing education unit credit for community, professional, and personal development to members of the local community and the region through workshops, forums, and conferences.

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The campus will establish community partnerships to support career pathways that increase student participation in certificate and degree programs and respond to partnership training needs.

The campus community of faculty and staff will be active leaders in a variety of service and governance contributions to the university, including Faculty Senate, Staff Council, Rural Affairs, CRA division chair and committees, and Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta Region organizations.

#### Accountability to students, faculty, staff, alumni, and the diverse peoples of Alaska

KuC upholds accountability to our students, faculty, staff, alumni and the people of the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta through formal and informal processes, including a wide variety of collaborative meetings and forums. Some of the key associates are:

#### Leadership for Alaska's people and institutions

KuC is a key partner in the Yuut Elitnaurviat (People's Learning Center). This is a new regional vocational and technical school serving high-school and adult learners. At full implementation, this project will serve 250 learners in a residential setting via a \$30 million facility. Seven major career pathways will be targeted, including: early childhood education information technology construction allied and behavior health business transportation

#### Excellence in programs and services

Through our status as a minority-serving and Alaska Native-serving institution, KuC has developed new programs that focus on meeting high demand workforce needs and have developed key partnerships to ensure quality programming.

#### Accessibility for all Alaskans

KuC course offerings are available through independent learning, on-campus, audio-conference, and intensive courses that provide accessibility to all local residents.

KuC has the highest proportion of Alaska Native enrollments in the state, serving a student base that is over 75 percent Alaska Native.

#### Dedication to serving community needs

KuC program delivery is based on regional needs. Through regional meetings and committees, program focus is based on organizational and work force needs.

#### Stewardship of Alaska's resources

### Major Component Accomplishments in 2002

#### Unity in promoting communication and collaboration

Regional adult basic education program has 197 full-time students in the region and seventy-five GED graduates.

Began partnership with Coastal Villages Region Fund and the Association of Village Council Presidents to implement village-based adult basic education program.

Expanded partnership with Bethel Native Corporation's Worker's Academy to assist adults in preparing for vocational training.

Implemented tutoring program for early childhood education students in region.

Implemented model of intensive instruction that increases student learning and success in college courses by teaching basic academic skills in conjunction with course content.

#### Accountability to students, faculty, staff, alumni, and the diverse peoples of Alaska

1,114 people attended continuing education functions in classes, forums, seminars, and miscellaneous events.

#### Leadership for Alaska's people and institutions

Hired new director, Robert Medinger, with extensive rural, Native, educational, and vocational education experience.

KuC offered driver's education for the first time outside of Bethel. It was offered in Toksook Bay.

#### Excellence in programs and services

Emerging scholars program:

At the start of spring semester FY 02, thirty-five emerging scholars program students were enrolled and thirty-four students completed the semester. Of the original cohort of students who started the program in fall 2000, three received their A.A. degrees the spring 2002 graduation.

Accessibility for all Alaskans

The fall 2001 enrollment in distance education had approximately 216 students plus seventy-eight from other regions in eight distance-delivered courses.

KuC supported seventy-seven courses from other regions and campuses.

KuC worked with approximately 213 students plus forty-three from other regions and delivered six distance courses.

KuC supported sixty-two courses from other regions and campuses.

KuC also worked with statewide and Center for Distance Education to improve telecommunications and to move the majority of teleconferencing traffic onto the Alaska Telephone Network.

Wrote KuC staff handbook and KuC distance student handbook.

#### Dedication to serving community needs

Student Services:

Improved customer service.

Hired a mental health counselor to support students.

Hired a night desk attendant and installed student safes.

Continued as a successful team with faculty and staff to ensure quality in advising.

Created a community housing referral base for students.

Assisted and coordinated with our service access specialist to develop a student advising database.

Continuing Education:

Community readings by well-known authors N. Scott Momaday and Barry Lopez.

KuC brought the Star Lab from Fairbanks for the community. Oscarville brought students to Bethel to see Star Lab. Helped to plan and coordinate the first arts and crafts conference to help local people who want to make a living by selling their Native arts and crafts.

Planned and implemented a women's health issues series

KuC helped in a voter registration drive at the high school.

#### Stewardship of Alaska's resources:

The campus planned and coordinated a forum called "Dust Busters" designed to heighten awareness of the health risks associated with glacial dust and to facilitate the community's discussion on dealing with the serious health problems and the allocation of funds to deal with these problems.

# Proposed Changes in Levels of Service for FY2004

The top priority for KuC is identifying and allocating additional UA/UAF hard-funding support to meet core administrative staff needs. With explosive program and enrollment growth underway due to grants and partnerships, the administrative support area is near collapse after fifteen years of inflation-adjusted real-dollar funding cuts, increased rural costs, and failure to replace retirement incentive program positions. Grant funds and earmarks will not rebuild this core.
