Department of Fish and Game Sport Fisheries Special Projects Component Budget Summary

## **Component: Sport Fisheries Special Projects**

#### **Contribution to Department's Mission**

This component has several strategies aimed at helping the department and division meet their missions. Specifically, strategies employed by this component include:

- · Maintain access to public resources.
- Review, permit, and reserve instream flows to minimize impacts of land and water development projects on Alaska's fish and wildlife resources and their uses.
- Enforce fish and game laws and regulations.
- · Maintain the viability of non-game aquatic fish and invertebrate resources.

#### **Core Services**

- Management
- · Habitat Assessment and Permitting
- · Access Development and Maintenance
- Enforcement Services

This component provides the budget structure for the state to address unexpected, often short-term, fisheries issues that develop during the course of a fishing season. Many of the programs within this component are partnerships between the Division of Sport Fish and local governments, schools, or private outdoor sports organizations to conduct projects designed to benefit sport fisheries. With the implementation of dual State/Federal Subsistence fisheries management, this component will fund the collection of information and provide technical review of issues and solutions to problems that may affect sport fishing opportunity.

### **Key Component Challenges**

Implementation of a dual State/Federal Subsistence fisheries management system is requiring the division to monitor sport fisheries throughout the state in order to determine if and when the opportunity to participate in sport fishing is at risk due to the federal subsistence process.

Salmon stocks have been declining all along the west coast. Funding has been provided to the division through a Pacific Salmon Treaty Letter of Agreement to collect information throughout the Southeast Region and Canada for purposes of rebuilding chinook stocks. Funding has also been made available through the Southeast Sustainable Salmon Fund to initiate an ecosystem wide sentinal monitoring program for coastwide stocks and their habitat, and evaluate management options for salmon stock covered by the Pacific Salmon Treaty.

#### Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2006

The division will complete a Statewide Comprehensive Wildlife Plan mandated by congress for use of federal state wildlife grant funds. This plan focuses on developing conservation actions for Alaska's non-game populations. Funding from the US Fish & Wildlife Service for the State Wildlife Grant program will be budgeted separately by the divisions of Sport Flsh

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and Wildlife Conservation for FY06.

The division has also developed new partnerships with various private organizations aimed at restoring damaged habitats. Also, continued funding from the Southeast Sustainable Salmon fund, Pacific Salmon Treaty Funds, and LOA funds will allow the division to initiate salmon assessment projects in the areas of Haines and Ketchikan, as well as enhance our instream flow protection capabilities throughout Southeast Alaska.

#### Major Component Accomplishments in 2004

The division continued to provide liaison activities aimed at minimizing the impact of federal subsistence intervention on Alaska's recreational and personal use fisheries. Support was also provided to Region III by the Federal Office of Subsistence Management to conduct nine research projects. Local communities were involved from project proposal to fieldwork. These projects included estimates of in-river abundance of chinook in the Copper, Kuskokwim, and Holitna rivers, and coho and chum in the Holitna River.

The division conducted four chinook salmon research projects in Southeast Alaska with funding from the Pacific Salmon Treaty. Projects included collection of biological data from chinook harvested in sport fisheries throughout the region as well as stock assessment projects on the Chilkat, Blossom, and Chickamin rivers. All projects were successfully completed and abundance chinook salmon abundance and spawning distribution was estimated for the Chilkat and Chickamin Rivers. In addition, the division completed mapping of habitat characteristics and spawning sites for all steelhead, coho, and chinook escapement index systems in the region.

A number of training opportunities were provided for division staff in the following general fields: habitat monitoring and sampling; GIS technology; leadership development; stock assessment technology and modeling; decision analysis methods; and data analysis techniques.

Finally, via a newly established criminal justice planner position, the division provided enforcement training to many of our staff as well as liaison functions between us and the Department and Public Safety.
