Brief Summary and Statement of Need:

This request is an estimation of potential federal receipt authority needed for FY08-FY13 projects at the main and community campuses. Prior small project federal receipt authority was used for Title III improvements to rural campuses including Bristol Bay and Chukchi (2005), the Allied Health Center at TVCC (2004) and the Center for Nanosensor Technology at UAF (2003). In the last two years there have been twelve different projects with three different federal agencies that utilized UA's previous small project receipt authority approved in 2005.

Prior funding: Small Project Receipt Authority (SLA 2003, Chapter 82, \$2.5 million Fed Rcpt, \$2.5 million Univ. Project Description/Justification:

Competing successfully for small grants from federal agencies has proven successful for UA in past years. These capital grants have enabled UA to add labs, renovate existing space to workforce program needs, and purchase major equipment. These opportunities will continue and having available federal receipt authority expedites UA's ability to meet the timelines of the programs. As a part of daily efforts faculty and staff watch for funding opportunities that will advance programs responsive to state need. This receipt authority mechanism allows those who are successful in garnering funds to utilize them in a timely fashion. The alternatives to having this open small project authority are budget amendments, supplemental requests, and revised programs for multiple projects in the \$200,000 to \$750,000 range and an occasional project for \$2 to \$3 million. The time lag is detrimental to the projects and the approval is likely below the threshold of true policy decisions.
