Key Department Challenges

ALASKA STATE COMMISSION FOR HUMAN RIGHTS

- During fiscal year 2007, nearly 3,000 Alaskans contacted the agency to inquire about their rights and responsibilities
 under Alaska's Human Rights Law. Despite streamlining processes, the imbalance between resources and demand
 for services continues to result in delays in processing cases. Costs for the adjudication of public hearing cases
 continue to rise while resolution of cases at hearing takes longer. The inability to resolve complaints quickly
 frustrates both the businesses charged with violating the law and the Alaskans who believe they have experienced
 discrimination.
- The Commission receives numerous requests for education and technical assistance. The agency continues to turn
 down requests for assistance from businesses and organizations seeking the Commission's expertise on Alaska's
 Human Rights Law about how best to prevent and eliminate discrimination through education, due to limited
 resources.

OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET

- Regardless of the price of oil, the state needs to balance its budget while maintaining stability for the Alaska
 economy and reliable services for Alaskans. While the current high oil prices are generating significant additional
 revenue for the state, it is recognized that this price level cannot be expected to be recurring.
- Continue to work to implement more effective results-based budgeting and decision-making.

DIVISION OF ELECTIONS

- Voter registration has increased. There are now over 166,445 more registered voters than were registered in 1990. In 2006, the Division processed over 143,300 voter registration applications. Automatic registration through the Division of Motor Vehicles generates over 36,000 registration forms a year.
- The number of voters voting absentee or early has increased. During the 2004 Presidential election, over 71,000 voters voted either an absentee or early ballot compared to 10 years ago with 35,223 voting absentee.
- The number of voters voting by questioned ballot increased. During the 2004 Presidential election, over 22,000 voters voted questioned ballots compared to 10 years ago with 16,000 voting questioned. Questioned turnout is expected to increase again during the 2008 Presidential election.
- In addition to programming the election, the division's workload in preparing for an election has increased due to the maintenance, functional testing, logic and accuracy testing, training and deployment of over 800 voting units.
- In 2006 and again for 2008, the division prepares and prints a Primary election voter pamphlet to inform voters about measures appearing on the Primary election ballot.
- The number of signatures filed by initiative petition sponsors has increased from an average of 36,100 signatures per petition to an average of over 45,900 signatures per petition. Additionally, the law requires the division to process signatures within 60 days from the time the petition is filed. Although the amount of signatures filed with a petition has increased, the time allowed for the division to process signatures has not changed.
- Despite all of these changes, the level of staffing in the Division has not changed in over 20 years.
- Begin implementation of a new statewide voter registration and election management system. The system will be in compliance with the new federal election reform laws.
- Continue to develop and implement proper procedures for transport and security, additional training of election
 officials and a public outreach and education campaign necessary to ensure public confidence and approved access
 to voters.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2009

Missions and Measures – OMB, working with the departments, has made significant progress in advancing the state along its journey to performance-based management and budget decision-making. In preparation for fiscal year 2009, all agencies have, with Missions and Measures as a foundation, created performance-based frameworks that communicate specific end results to be delivered, enabling strategies, performance targets with attendant measures, and logically connected programmatic activities. These "road maps" are being used by OMB to guide funding recommendations and by agency management as a tool to assist in making forward-looking, results-focused management and budget decisions.

Major Department Accomplishments in 2007

ALASKA STATE COMMISSION FOR HUMAN RIGHTS

- Due to the restoration by the Legislature of previously lost positions, by the end of FY2007 the ASCHR eliminated its backlog of cases waiting for initial assignment. All cases are now assigned for investigation or actively processed in mediation within thirty days of filing.
- The Commission's mediation program provides Alaska businesses and complainants the opportunity to voluntarily reach a mutually acceptable resolution to claims of discrimination. The mediation program successfully resolved more cases this past year. Both the business community and individuals applaud the opportunities provided by the program.

OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET

- A primary criterion for judging the performance of OMB is how much of the Governor's agenda, as expressed in the
 annual budget proposal, gets enacted into law. Since the Legislature has the ultimate power of appropriation,
 passage of the initiatives embodied in the Governor's budget proposal is more important than number targets. The
 Legislature passed bills that contained four of the Governor's main budget goals:
 - 1. Treated the FY07 general fund surplus as a windfall. One billion dollars was deposited into the Public Education Fund for funding K-12 education in FY09.
 - 2. \$48.7 million was appropriated to local governments as a form of revenue sharing in FY08.
 - 3. The Senior Benefits program was adopted by the Legislature during the first special session in July 2007.
 - 4. Nearly \$455 million was appropriated to lower the employer contribution rates to the Public Employees Retirement System and the Teachers Retirement System, while contributing towards reducing the unfunded liability in those retirement systems.

- Continued to improve the capacity for agencies to align resources with priority service results by enhancing the Missions and Measures performance management program.
- Further refined the Missions and measures web site as a communication tool on how public money is being invested to produce results that matter to Alaskans.
- Made substantial improvements to the online Alaska Budget System used by departments to submit their budgets to OMB.

DIVISION OF ELECTIONS

- Conducted a statewide special election, 22 REAA/CRSA elections, the Deltana and Skagway Incorporation elections and the Chatham School District Recall election.
- In accordance with the National Voter Registration Act and state law, the Division moved 14,500 voters to inactive status.
- Verified signatures for a record number of initiative and recall petitions.
- Made application for and received federal monies under the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) for polling place accessibility.
- Updated the HAVA State Plan in preparation for the 2008 elections.
- Developed a new retention schedule and filing system for the division.
