In 2013/14 funding from United Way was \$45,000 and funding from Best Beginnings was \$181,000. Corporate and individual donations was \$23,000 and the state capital was \$15,000. Total project cost in 2013/14 is \$258,000

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The Anchorage Imagination Library (AIL), a local affiliate of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, provides a book every month to 8,709 children in the Municipality of Anchorage. All Anchorage children from birth to age 5 are eligible to participate in the program which works to encourage reading in the home and help prepare children to enter kindergarten ready to succeed. The program cost is just \$30 per child for a book every month for a year. AlL also organizes free events to give parents tools to make reading fun and extend the learning. In 2013, AIL's 8 events throughout the city attracted 1,638 participants. Scientific studies* have confirmed that Imagination Library children are better prepared for kindergarten, and the earlier they're enrolled, the better. The effect lingers: participating children score higher on third grade reading tests.

Part of Best Beginnings, the AIL program is managed and delivered by volunteers. This keeps administrative costs very low. The state funding would be matched dollar for dollar with private and local contributions. In the past 12 months, AIL's enrollment has grown from 7,389 to 8,709 children--or 39% of Anchorage's children under age five. The monthly invoice for books and postage is more than \$18,000 and growing.

The money provided through the capital budget will go towards continuing to grow the program, particularly in AIL's target areas: Mountain View, Fairview and Spenard. Without these funds, AIL could be forced to cap growth and turn away new participants from a low-cost program that has proven benefits. The program is scalable and all capital funding will be put toward books and postage.

The Anchorage Imagination Library has provided more than 250,000 books to children under five in Anchorage since 2009. Here are some highlights:

- For only \$30 per year, each child receives a book every month in the mail;
- More than 8,600 children currently receive books; enrollment has grown by over 1,000 children in the last year;
- There are almost no administrative costs, as the support work is mostly done by volunteers
 who believe that all Anchorage children deserve access to quality children's books so that they
 enter kindergarten eager and ready to learn;
- While all Anchorage children are eligible for the program, we target enrollment activities in low income neighborhoods, at charitable events like Neighborhood Gift and through the Program for Infants and Children;
- Hundreds of children and parents attend our popular monthly events designed to give parents tools to make reading at home fun;
- To date, the program has been funded with local donations from various groups and individuals, along with support from Best Beginnings and the United Way, because they recognize the tremendous value of inspiring parents to read to their children;
- We pick up undeliverable books from Anchorage's post offices every month for delivery to homeless shelters, reaching some of the most vulnerable children in our community.

This project is part of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. It has been shown to improve student performance and better prepare youngsters for kindergarten, in a study conducted by the Tennessee Board of Regents. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library selects high-quality books, negotiates with publishers and arranges the mailing, but each local program must raise funds to pay for the books and postage.

We are asking for support from your discretionary funds. For only \$75,000, we could send a high-quality book every month for a year to 2,500 children in Anchorage, Girdwood and Eagle River. None of the dollars are spent for administration. And best of all, it helps get kids in our community ready for success in school. What a smart investment!
