Detailed Project Description and Justification:

Description

We are requesting \$600,000 to plan, renovate and furnish the existing Bristol Bay School District's Central Office building, located in Naknek, Alaska, into a housing/training facility that can house approximately 24 students per CTE training phase. Both school districts are willing to support the maintenance and operation costs of the facility through a Memorandum of Understanding. The Lake and Peninsula and Bristol Bay Borough's are supportive of the project and it supports regional workforce and economic development efforts.

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The goal of providing a quality Career and Technical Education (CTE) program to Bristol Bay and Lake and Peninsula School District student's depends on both entities working together to maximize the use of human, physical and monetary resources. We are proposing to renovate an existing building that is located on Bristol Bay High School's campus to house/train students during the CTE phases. This facility will also have a common area that will support small group instruction. The CTE program utilizes Bristol Bay High School's classrooms, industrial shop, swimming pool, computer labs and culinary art facility for training. This housing/training facility will eliminate the cost of housing, which is approximately \$47,000 a year, which will support making the CTE program sustainable in the future. Utilizing funds that were spent on housing in the past will enable the CTE program to serve more students, offer more sessions and expand course offerings.

Transportation costs will be reduced as students will not have to be transported to CTE training phases held in Naknek as the housing/training facility will be located on the Bristol Bay High School campus. The costs of meals will also be reduced, as students will be able to utilize the school lunch program for their meals while attending training.

Lodging/Meals Costs:

Year 2: \$57,800 Year 3: \$54,810

This project also has the potential to provide on-the-job training (apprenticeship) to students in the Facility Maintenance and Repair program.

Current Career and Technical Education Program Background:

For the past three years Bristol Bay School District (BBSD) and Lake and Peninsula School District (LPSD) have worked together to provide quality CTE training to students. Instruction is delivered in Bristol Bay High School's classrooms, industrial shop, swimming pool, computer labs and culinary art facility. Local lodges and the college have provided housing for the students at a cost of approximately \$47,000 a year. The CTE program funding has been challenging, but has been overcome through combined resources and partnerships. Program support for CTE training phases has been received from the following partners: Bristol Bay Native Association, University of Alaska-Fairbanks, Lake and Peninsula Borough, Alaska Construction Academies, local businesses and Wells Fargo Bank.

The career and technical education programs are career-focused and geared at meeting the region's critical workforce needs. Currently, there are three CTE training phases offered per year with three to four course offerings per phase. The phases are week long with the daily schedule from 7 am to 10 pm. The daily schedule includes 10 hours of instruction with breaks for meals and a one-hour social time. Students learn transition/life skills to be successful in life after high school. These programs help ensure that students exit high school with a career path, post-secondary training plan and/or employment.

In two years, 120 students have received high school and college credit and/or industry-recognized certification in the following areas: Small Engines, Welding, Construction Trades, Web Design, Entrepreneurship, Finance, Word/Excel/Adobe, Occupational Facility Maintenance Endorsements, Maritime "Six Pack" and Captain Certification, Culinary Arts, Heavy Equipment Training and Emergency Trauma Technician. Evening classes have included: Basic First Aid/CPR, OSHA 10, Water Safety, Job Readiness, Native Carving, Photography, Drivers Training (both written and behind the wheel). Students

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have earned over 300 industry-recognized certifications during these sessions!

The success of the program over the past three years is proof of the district's willingness to work collaboratively to provide quality CTE offerings to students in the region. The CTE program has grown each year, the logical next step in sustaining the program and continuing growth is to have a housing/training facility that is permanent in nature and cost-effective.
