Additional Information / Prior Funding History:

Village Safe Water CIP Project Administration has received prior appropriations of \$1,586.3 in FY 98, \$1,441.0 in FY 99 and \$1,750.1 in FY 00.

Project Description/Justification:

The Village Safe Water program provides technical and financial support to Alaska's smallest communities to design and construct water, wastewater and solid waste facilities. Each year, grant funds are made available to the State through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Rural Development (USDA-RD) program. Those funds require the State to appropriate matching funds. Communities apply each year to the State for grants for sanitation projects. Applications are scored weighing primarily the extent to which proposed projects address critical public health needs, as well as the communities' capacity to operate and maintain the facilities. Grants are awarded to local governments for the highest ranking projects. Village Safe Water program engineers work directly with community officials to make sure that planning results in facilities that are appropriate for each community, that facilities are properly and efficiently constructed, and that state and federal grant funds are used appropriately.

This particular appropriation funds the cost of delivering Village Safe Water services to the communities. These funds are transferred to the operating budget as CIP receipts to pay for the Village Safe Water engineers and other program staff, as well as associated travel, contracts, supplies and equipment.
