Component: Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP)

Contribution to Department's Mission

To reduce alcoholism and substance abuse.

The mission of the Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP) is to screen, refer and monitor both adult and juvenile offenders to ensure that they complete the substance abuse education or treatment program that is prescribed by the courts, Division of Motor Vehicles, and/or Division of Juvenile Justice.

Core Services

The ASAP is both a direct service provider in the Anchorage area and the oversight office for the Division's statewide ASAP grant programs. The program facilitates entry of all misdemeanor defendants ordered by the court into substance abuse education and/or treatment, monitors court requirements, and provides data regarding those defendants. In its grants management role, the ASAP provides training to qualify administrators for ASAP grant programs throughout the state, and provides quality control and monitoring functions on all state-approved ASAP programs.

Key Component Challenges

The Alcohol Safety Action Program has extensively reviewed both the juvenile and adult components to ensure that clients are held accountable, equity exists in caseloads, and the program is moving towards self-sufficiency. Prior to this year, the case management fee for the ASAP program was only \$100, and this did not cover the true costs of approximately \$200 per client. The case management fee has been increased to \$200, but challenges remain in the collection of the funds from clients. Even though clients are required to pay for services, ASAP must not refuse services to any client based on fees.

Additionally, it is recognized that ASAP provides an invaluable and necessary service that is needed in all major communities throughout Alaska. However, budget constraints preclude the needed expansion, and we have worked to keep ASAP in as many communities, as financially feasible.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2006

In FY 2006, ASAP will contract with a collection agency to significantly reduce the current amount of unpaid debt. This will allow the program to increase the amount of client fees generated to support the program. Additionally ASAP will be working with the Alaska Court System to offset a portion of the ASAP costs through court fines/fees, as well as provide case management services for the various therapeutic courts.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2004

During FY04, ASAP was able to work with legislators to continue the adult ASAP program in a number of communities

through Alaska. This continuation allowed the program to continue successfully monitoring education and treatment requirements imposed to ensure that fewer clients will return with new cases. As noted in the ASAP Efficacy Study, 65-66% of the clients involved in the ASAP program do not re-offend within a 3 year period of time.

Additionally, this component provided quality assurance, technical assistance, grant monitoring, planning and policy development, and data collection for direct services in the Anchorage area as well as the other five ASAP grantees.
