Project Description/Justification:

This project will use \$2,000,000 in FFY2007 federal funding from the Indian Health Service to provide subgrants to the nonprofit regional Native corporations to hire and equip additional village public safety officers (VPSOs) in rural Alaskan villages to engage primarily in bootlegging prevention and enforcement activities. \$2,000,000 was also appropriated in FFY2004, FFY2005, and FFY2006 to the Alaska Department of Public Safety for this purpose.

Rural Alaska continues to endure high rates of violent crimes such as homicides, sexual assaults, and serious domestic assaults. The majority of these crimes are directly connected to alcohol abuse. This grant will be used to distribute funds to the nonprofit regional Native corporations participating in the VPSO program to hire, train, and equip additional VPSOs to focus primarily on illegal alcohol interdiction and to enforce other state laws. This will help to significantly reduce violent crime, accidental deaths, and suicide resulting from the easy availability of illegal alcohol through VPSO presence, education, and aggressive bootlegging investigations. The additional VPSOs will be located in rural areas of western Alaska such as the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta, Bristol Bay, the Aleutian Islands, and Kotzebue region.
