Detailed Project Description and Justification:

Civic education and engagement is a vital component of Alaska's democracy and, for emerging leaders, an instrumental vehicle for encouraging involvement in the state's future. The Institute of the North will build on its Alaska Dialogue series to include dialogue with emerging leaders across the state, communicating to them the obligations of citizenship.

The Institute of the North has a legacy in Alaska of providing established leaders an opportunity to engage with one another to address critical public policy issues. Since its inception in 2000, the Alaska Dialogue has been a forum where Alaska's leaders put Alaska first, working together to sustain and strengthen the state and its communities. More recently, the Institute developed an emerging leaders program that focuses on communicating to the next generation of Alaska's leaders their responsibilities to each other and the state. We express this in terms of the obligations of ownership - Alaskans must understand the issues facing the state, the history of Alaska and its unique laws, even as they engage with one another to address the state's challenges and provide new opportunities. Building upon the Institute's seminal curriculum for the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act of 1980 (ANILCA), the Emerging Leaders Dialogue incorporates civic education and engagement. Modeled from the Alaska Dialogue, this is a dynamic venue for young leaders from across the state to come together, develop relationships and lead by example. Additionally, throughout the year Institute staff work with emerging leaders to find new and different ways of becoming involved in the civic process. This has meant meeting with emerging leader groups in Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau, Petersburg and Barrow. Invitations to Valdez, Ketchikan, Nome, Kotzebue, Dillingham, Bethel and Kenai still need to be fulfilled. Alaska's future rests on the state's ability to retain its young leaders as well as attract new ones. Alaska's future leaders must have a firm understanding of their responsibilities. The

Institute of the North is committed to educating, engaging and empowering Alaska's emerging leaders in this process.

Project Timeline:

This project will take place in FY11. Travel to, and dialogue in, communities across the state will take place throughout the year. The Alaska Dialogue occurs in September and the Emerging Leaders Dialogue in May.


