Explanation of Other Funds:

AHFC provided a grant in the amount \$250,000

for acquisition. AHFC Homeless Assistance Program (BHAP) grant has been filed. Additional funding will be sought from community organizations.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

Municipality of Anchorage 2008-2012 Consolidated Plan describes our target population, homeless young adults between the ages of 18-24 an ar area of concern; an increasing at-risk population for homelessness. The plan states that "youth paid minimum wage cannot meet the cost of even a studio apartment in Anchorage, should they be lucky enough to find one. Youth who "couch surf" (migrate on a short-term basis through a variety of friends' homes) do not link well to existing residential services for a number of reasons." The need to address youth homelessness is exacerbated by the weather. Calculating the number of homeless youth can only be estimated.

This project not only promises to provide shelter but it also promises to assist young adults reach self sufficiency while easing their housing burden thus allowing them to concentrate on their education. Our proposed program will provide them the opportunity to focus on increasing their job skills, a supportive network via our mentorship program will be encouraged and our training offering will increase their knowledge base. The mentorship component of the LIFE project promotes the integration of services to include, but not limited to relationship fostering and role modeling, skill building, mentoring, and
