Component: Offender Habilitation Programs

Contribution to Department's Mission

Provide behavioral intervention programs to offenders.

Core Services

- Education Programs
- Domestic Violence Programs
- Chaplaincy Programs

Key Component Challenges

Introduce and implement the Reentry – Integrated Case Management and Supervision (ICMS) Model to achieve the goals of community safety through successful offender transition and re-entry to society. The model will include incentives for prisoner participation. ICMS will be implemented in place of many past correctional education programs in our institutions. Trainings will be designed for positive implementation of the new reentry program model.

Conduct centralized General Education Diploma testing for institutions in the south central region. Lead Education Coordinators in implementing and using standardized Criminal Attitudes Program (CAP), Federal Bureau of Prisons Re-Entry Survival instruction and "InsideOut Dad" parenting program. Direct the focus of Education Coordinators in four areas of education: Adult Basic Education (ABE), General Education Diploma (GED), vocational education, and apprenticeship programs.

Employ the ICMS Model, CAP, and other evidence based practice principles in delivering reentry programs. Evidence based programs focused on "criminogenic needs," which are risk factors for criminal behavior. These risk factors refer to the individual's characteristics and circumstances predictive of increased risks for future criminal activity. Education Coordinators will be encouraged to help identify and present evidence based practices.

Expand the U.S. Department of Labor Apprenticeship Programs, Workplace and Community Transition (WCT) Training for Incarcerated Offenders and vocational training programs currently available at Fairbanks Correctional Center, Hiland Mountain Correctional Center, Palmer Correctional Center, Spring Creek Correctional Center and Wild Wood Correctional Center.

Ensure the Department of Correction's Education Coordinators are well skilled to accomplish stated training/ facilitation by providing them with the proper tools, resources and training.

Develop incentive/disincentives for prisoners to participate fully in their habilitation and take total advantage of educational, vocational and reentry program opportunities. This challenge will entail creative "sticks and carrots," applied with compassion and consistency to assist prisoners in developing and valuing personal responsibility for their decisions and actions thus enhancing habilitation efforts and reducing recidivism.

Reentry - Integrated Case Management & Supervision (ICMS) Model Implementation

The ICMS model has five components; these components represent eight core principles which are implemented in three phases through six core activities. Phase II comprises the educational/reentry element:

Re-Entry/transition Unit currently operational at SCCC with planned implementation at other facilities as well. These units will employ a phased process to prepare prisoners with evidence based treatment programs in an effort to reduce recidivism. Treatment programs include:

Criminal Attitudes Program (CAP). This is a comprehensive cognitive-behavioral program that focuses specifically on the attitudes, values, beliefs and rationalizations conducive to criminality. It is a 22 session program that will be available in all thirteen (13) institutions through the education department by years end.

Federal Bureau of Prisons Re-Entry Survival Manual. This program is based on the experiences of prisoners who reentered the community. This experience-based approach to reentry readiness shares with prisoners the need for a

plan for successful community living and determines if they are "reentry ready." This manual assists incarcerated individuals in obtaining information to address issues such as: required personal identification, home plan, career plan, parole plan, social support plan and idle time plan. The *Reentry Readiness: Are You Ready* prisoner workbook asks ten (10) questions and based on those answers, operates on a green light (ready to reenter society), yellow light (proceed with caution), and red light (not ready).

Parenting Inside/Out Dad. This is a 12 session program that provides practical and innovative ways to help overcome the physical and psychological challenges that incarcerated fathers face both inside and out of prison. This program is offered in all facilities through the education department. Hiland Mountain Correctional Center offers the *Active Parenting Today* program for the female offenders. Both programs are designed to diminish intergenerational criminality.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2011

In conjunction with Department of Labor, expand the Construction Apprenticeship Program.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2009

During the last year 239 offenders received their General Education Development (GED) diploma while incarcerated in FY2009. This is a 31.3% increase from FY2008. Eleven (11) youth offenders received their High School diplomas at Spring Creek Correctional Center High School while enrolled in the Youth Offender Program.

In FY2009, the Department of Corrections continued partnering with Department of Labor and Workforce Development to assist with reentry and support apprenticeship training programs at Fairbanks Correctional Center, Hiland Mountain Correctional Center, Palmer Correctional Center, Point MacKenzie Correctional Farm, Spring Creek Correctional Center and Wildwood Correctional Center.

Anchorage Correctional Complex (ACC) networked computer lab, taught by an AmeriCorps contractor, instructs prisoners on completing resumes and learning basic computer skills such as Windows, Word, Excel, and keyboarding skills. Prisoners who complete the basic level may enter the "tech prep" program – a joint program with UAA- wherein, for a reduced price, they can gain college credit for specific computer application programs, like Excel or Word. This is the third year ACC has successfully utilized AmeriCorps members to teach programs at ACC –East. Moreover, they have a counselor from the Educational Opportunity Center, a federal program housed at UAA, who visits monthly and does a workshop on financial aid for vocational and academic training.

Hiland Mountain Correctional Center (HMCC) Education partnered with the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development Eagle River Job Center to provide a seven week pre-release preparation course including resume writing, job searches and interviewing. This facility also adopted out two service dogs during this fiscal year that were given to gulf war veterans in addition a continued program for obedience training.

Palmer Correctional Center (PCC) continues developing a Vocational Education Programming, increasing the number of classes in the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) core and Carpentry Level I programs and begin transition planning for those prisoners seeking employment or additional training upon release from incarceration. Besides implementing the ICMS model, Palmer Correctional Center will expand their working partnerships with the Waylon Baptist University and the University of Alaska, Anchorage in order to provide additional on site college level courses to apprentices and the general population.

Point MacKenzie Correctional Farm (PMCF) completed their first National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) core curriculum class. Seven (7) prisoners began the program and 4 completed all modules and were registered with NCCER. As part of the class they constructed a large playhouse from floor to roof, including trusses. The next class has just begun with eight (8) students.

Spring Creek Correctional Center graduated its first three apprentices, from its newly redeveloped Cook apprenticeship program, in September of 2009. Currently, Spring Creek has a total of eleven (11) active Cook apprentices and five actively participating Building Maintenance Repairer (BMR) apprentices. These Cook and BMR apprenticeship programs are in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Labor Office of Apprenticeship. Also at Spring Creek Correctional Center, twenty-six (26) offenders took advantage of the WCT grant program during 2009 and were enrolled or are currently enrolled in entry level college courses through UAF and Milwaukee Area Technical College. The courses of pre-

algebra, pre-calculus, Alaskan history, anthropology, and speech are currently being offered and will be completed by year's end.

Wildwood Correctional Center (WWCC) and Pre-Trial graduated one Baker apprentice from their expanded apprentice program last year joining four (4) previous graduates of past years. Currently Wildwood Correctional Center has a total of six (6) active apprentices: two (2) Electricians, one (1) Plumber, one (1) Building Maintenance, one (1) Baker, and one (1) Cook apprentice. All apprentice programs are conducted under the direction of the U.S. Department of Labor Office of Apprenticeship. All programs are tied together with comprehensive health and safety programs for entry into oil field owner or contractor entry positions.

Wildwood Correctional Center is an active participant in the Department of Education grant for Microsoft Office Suite Certification, and Internet and Computing Core Certification (aka IC3). They have certified ten (10) prisoners so far this year. Fifty-two (52) Certiport Certification exams have been administered to date with forty-seven (47) exams passed. Four (4) prisoners have achieved the Master's Certificate level having each passed five (5) Office 2003 Application exams, including Word and Excel at the expert level.

Wildwood Correctional Center's pre-release program utilizes the Corrections Learning Network "Merging Two Worlds" program, the Federal Bureau of Prison's "Reentry Survival Manual", and a series of job ability surveys. Listings of services in their releasing city are also given to all prisoners. All prisoners coming into this facility fill out a self-reporting form on their education level. If Adult Basic Education (ABE) or General Education Development (GED) is needed we provide this in a timely manner. They graduated twenty seven (27) prisoners last year. Any prisoner pursuing college level courses is fully supported in their efforts by staff and the Education Department.

The Faith-based Residential program, Transformational Living Community (TLC) at Palmer Correctional Center (PCC) opened February 2004, is now in its sixth year of operation. A maximum of 37 residents occupy one complete housing unit in this intensive 12-18 month therapeutic program. All program costs, including staffing, are funded by private sector donations through Alaska Correctional Ministries. Since the TLC inception there have been a total of 68 graduates. Sixty-one (61) graduates have been released back into society and the program maintains a 70% plus success rate.

Transfer unrealized authorization from the Offender Habilitation Program component to the Goose Creek Correctional Center in support of the new prison. This receipt authority was previously associated with the Star Schools Education Program which is no longer available to the department.

The Department of Corrections (DOC) has a 25 year lease-purchase contract with the Matanuska-Susitna Borough (MSB) for the construction of a 1,536 bed correctional facility utilizing state reimbursed bonds. This request will establish authorization allowing the DOC to receive and expend revenues from the MSB. These revenues are generated by the MSB from the sale of bonds for the construction of Goose Creek Correctional Center.

The department is responsible for determining the project design, design-build solicitation scope; and, assuring the facility is constructed to meet State requirements. In order to do so, the DOC will contract with a technical advisory consultant who will assure all architectural, structural, electrical, and mechanical design-build specifications are in compliance. The DOC will also enter into professional services agreements for the construction oversight, evaluation, design, and quality assurance associated with construction of the new prison.

During FY2008 the Department of Corrections began an apprenticeship program in conjunction with the Department of Labor at the Palmer Correctional Center (PCC). The first success is the construction of three 20/bed housing units at PCC, these were constructed beginning in FY2008 and completed and occupied in FY2009. This request will allow the expansion of the program beyond PCC to other institutions.

Providing vocational education to inmates increases their likelihood of employment following release. Meaningful employment leads to financial stability. This can be a turning-point for the ex-offender. Becoming financially stable and becoming a functional member of the community lessens the likelihood of their
