Project Description/Justification:

Much of the State's pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure dates to the 1980's and earlier. Pavement surfaces have cracked or broken due to natural aging, frost heaves, root damage from nearby trees, and other causes. Shoulders and drainage structures have eroded or failed over time. Culverts have been pushed up by frost jacking creating safety hazards on the paths above and drainage problems. Signs have been blown over by winds or knocked down by crashes. In other areas, nearby vegetation has overgrown trails to make them partially or fully impassable or create security hazards for users. The intent of this project is to address the problems of aging pavements, eroding and deteriorating bases, failing drainage, faded or missing signs and striping, broken, missing or substandard lighting, infringing vegetation and damage caused by trees, and to correct deficiencies in older designs. It will allow the state to take advantage of federal funding whose use is limited to pedestrian, bicycle and other transportation enhancement activities; funding that may not be reallocated to other uses and if unclaimed by the state would be reallocated to other states.
