






TABLE TALK

Scavenger Hunt Methodology for Education of Public Transit

Ethnic groups—where English is not the first language—are often the least likely to use public transit unless they are shown through first-hand experience. This reluctance to use public transportation results in isolation and increased costs because they often take expensive taxis or they use unsafe practices such as accepting rides from strangers. Few elected officials have experienced the transit system they fund.

Through the Scavenger Hunt method, teams (including conference attendees) will use the public transit system to: 1) view the city through transferring between routes, 2) experience a method for teaching new riders how to use the system and 3) compete in a fun learning experience. The People Mover director has partnered with the Anchorage Citizens Coalition to put this informative learning opportunity together.

The scavenger hunt method for teaching has proven to increase usage and reduce anxiety. The hunt will be conducted with teams made up of various age groups including some elected officials. Bikes can also be used.

If you’re interested, check the box on the enclosed registration form. It is included in your registration fee, but space is limited to the first twenty.

The Scavenger Hunt starts from the Egan Center, noon on Wednesday. Presented by the Anchorage Citizens Coalition. ***This event is FREE for NUSA registrants.***

Martin Buser, Thursday Breakfast

Martin Buser was born in Winterthur, Switzerland in 1958 and moved to Alaska in 1979 to learn more about sled dog training and care. He ran his first Iditarod in 1980 after working with Alaskan mushers Earl and Natalie Norris.

Martin Buser is a four-time winner of the Iditarod (1992, 1994, 1997, 2002) and his 2002 team holds the record for the fastest Iditarod, completing it in 8 days, 22 hours, 46 minutes and 2 seconds. He ran the race in 1980 and 1981 as well as running it from 1986 to 2010 and holds the record for consecutive runs (27). He won the Leonhard Seppala (Humanitarian) Award four times (1988, 1993, 1995 and 1997), and the Sportsmanship and Most Inspirational Awards in 2005 after completing the race with his finger injured in a woodworking accident and amputated four days before the start of the Iditarod.

He resides in Big Lake, Alaska with his wife Katy Chapoton and two sons Nikolai and Rohn (named after two checkpoints on the Iditarod Trail). He became a naturalized U.S. citizen in 2002 after his Iditarod victory. He speaks to youth on the care and treatment of animals and brings


some of his dogs to his many speaking engagements. When not mushing or speaking, he spends time with his hobbies: carpentry and woodturning.



Father Michael Oleksa, Saturday Lunch

The Reverend Dr. Michael James Oleksa has spent the last 35 years in Alaska, serving as village priest, university professor, consultant on intercultural relations and communications, and authoring several books on Alaska Native cultures and history. A 1969 graduate of Georgetown University and of St. Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary, Father Oleksa earned his doctoral degree in Presov, Slovakia, in 1988. His four-part PBS television series, *Communicating Across Cultures*, has been widely acclaimed.

The recipient of numerous awards from local, state and federal agencies, as well as the Alaska Federation of Natives, Father Michael has taught on all three main campuses of the University of Alaska system and at Alaska Pacific University. He currently resides in Anchorage with his Yup'ik wife, Xenia, his daughter Anastasia and one of his three grandsons.

Come and visit our 1989 NOTY award winner and see how far they have come since the neighborhood began taking the first steps out of the turmoil that started with a zoning change in 1964. The change allowed 1940's era single-family homes to be demolished and replaced by multi-family units. In 1965 Glenn highway construction separated the community from the rest of the city, greatly reducing it's value as a retail center.

You will see first hand how the Mountain View Community Council has worked closely with our Municipality, the Anchorage Community Land Trust, private businesses and other non profits to bring about a new beginning. The tour will highlight new affordable homes by Cook Inlet Housing Authority and Habitat for Humanity and renovated existing houses by NeighborWorks Anchorage. You'll see the retail center that is coming to life with new retail space, local businesses, and the opening of a bank branch for the first time in 20 years. Continue on to see the new schools that have been built, community gardens established and parks that have been renovated. Have dinner at the new Community Center/Boys & Girls Club facility.

You can discuss with Community Council members ways they've brought neighbors together through the annual Clean Up, 4th of July Picnic and Annual Street Fair; their active Community Patrol; and how they work with the Municipality of Anchorage to get rid of junk cars and other code violations. Experience the multi-cultural neighborhood (92 languages spoken in middle school) that is working toward a better tomorrow for everyone.

Growing Green under the Midnight Sun

Alaska gardeners don't get much sleep from May through September trying to keep up with the long hours of daylight and a short growing season. Your tour hosts, the Master Gardeners, will put down their hoes and take you on a colorful and diverse tour of the City's many gardens. The tour starts with a stroll from the conference center to Town Square. Along the way you'll admire the hanging flower baskets made possible by the Anchorage Downtown Partnership and the City's horticulture division through their beautification program and volunteers. You'll see the City's annual flower beds taking shape as you walk through the Square to the waiting bus. Stop to appreciate gardens in the downtown area that boast of blooming spring bulbs, early blooming wildflowers and rock gardens. On to the C Street Community Gardens, one of three in the City to promote access to land, education and resources for growing food in environmentally sustainable ways, and to create a food system where locally produced, affordable, and nutritious food is available to all. Walk through the gardens with Alaska Center for the Environment sustainable community experts to discuss community involvement and projects, the local food movement, and organic food production as a diverse array of busy gardeners prepare plots for spring planting. Join the Master Gardeners at dinner for an opportunity for questions and answers on food safety, food security, vegetable and flower gardening.

Community and Problem Oriented Policing in Anchorage

This bus tour of two older neighborhoods in Anchorage-Fairview and Spenard-focuses on the activities of the Anchorage Police Department's Community Action Policing (CAP) Team. The CAP team was formed four years ago in response to community demand in Fairview for the police to deal with the problems of chronic public inebriates, street prostitution, and open-air drug sales. The tour includes presentations by community leaders from Fairview and Spenard and members of the CAP Team concerning the interaction between the police department and community groups. Strategies and tactics employed by the CAP Team will be discussed while key locations or "hot spots" in both neighborhoods will be visited. The Fairview portion of the tour will also include many of the sites presented in the Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) and Defensible Space workshop. The tour concludes with a community pot luck meal at the Spenard Recreation Center.

North Star

A Creek Runs Through It

Conveniently located between Anchorage’s thriving downtown and midtown commercial area, North Star is an oasis of green in a mix of single family homes, condos, duplex and apartment buildings. Our population tends to be younger and enjoys the physically active side of life. Many move here for access to the Chester Creek greenbelt and trail that runs the length of the neighborhood to the Westchester Lagoon and Tony Knowles Coastal Trail recreational areas. Residents walk in the summer, cross country ski in the winter and play disc golf year round. Our tour will include stops at the Lagoon, Coastal Trail, and Chester Creek greenbelts where you will meet long-time residents who helped save the greenbelts and advocate for additional recreational facilities. Visit the Valley of the Moon Park and learn how local residents formed a task force to raise funds and develop a plan for renovating the extremely popular park. Share our pride in how our community came together to advocate for the construction of a pathway down Romig Hill that connects the neighborhood with the hip Spenard shopping district. We will tour a local artist’s metal working studio and have an Alaska seafood dinner and potluck. Hosted by: *North Star Community Council*



South Addition and Turnagain Coastal Gems

From the Park Strip downtown to Anchorage International Airport these council areas share a coast line, a coastal trail, and a commitment to make their communities a great place to live. Your tour begins with South Addition at the Delaney Park Strip, the oldest park in the City. Originally a fire break, it later became Anchorage's first landing strip evidenced by historic FAA housing and Bush Pilots Row. Continue through the mix of upscale older homes and small local businesses to Westchester Lagoon, created by an urban renewal program in 1963. The Lagoon and adjoining park provide waterfowl habitat, access to healthy outdoor activities, the first ADA accessible trail in Alaska, and is headquarters to the volunteer Trail Watch Program. Across the lagoon we'll arrive in Turnagain, a neighborhood of mid 20th century homes. Located along the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail we'll stop at Lyn Ary Park to view Cook Inlet, Denali and the downtown skyline. At Earthquake Park observe interpretive displays where huge tracks of land opened up during the 1964 Good Friday Earthquake, and 75 homes slid into the Cook Inlet. Experience the sight and sounds at Lake Hood, the largest and busiest seaplane base in the world. Learn how the community is active in Lake Hood and International Airport issues that affect the nearby neighborhoods and parks.

I Love Muldoon

No Longer Wilderness, But You Can Still See It From Here.

In the winter of '40, Muldoon Road was a muddy trail through a spruce forest inhabited by moose and bears, bisected by a thriving salmon stream. Seventy years later, Muldoon is still home to moose, bears, salmon, beavers, eagles and at least 50,000 people. Catch a glimpse of the beaver dam that regulates the flow of Chester Creek where residents hope to create a town square park. You'll learn how the creek once channeled through culverts is being restored to flow freely through natural topography. Visit Creekside Town Center as it takes shape with pedestrian friendly, mixed-income housing, community-based retail stores, and a new school. See Cook Inlet Housing Authority's new Centennial Village which provides housing for low to middle income seniors on 20 beautiful acres. Learn how volunteers support parks and green spaces through projects to update playground equipment, increase security, beautify, and defend against encroaching development. From the Botanical Garden to the Alaska Native Heritage Center, Muldoon is a work in progress as community council members endeavor to guide growth, redevelopment and work with our military neighbors.

Wild About Anchorage

Fish, and Birds, and Moose! Oh, My

When it comes to urban wildlife, there's no place like Anchorage where more than 1,900 moose, 250 black bears and 65 brown bears call home. Wildlife viewing is at nature's discretion, but this tour will provide guaranteed viewing of some of Alaska's native birds and salmon. Your tour will take you to Ship Creek, Alaska's most productive king salmon sport fishery – located right in downtown! Participants will visit the nearby Hatchery, which rears juvenile salmon to be released into the creek each year to begin their journey to the ocean. At the nearby salmon viewing area you'll see wild King salmon struggle upstream as they return to spawn. Next stop is the Bird Treatment and Learning Center which is dedicated to rehabilitating sick, injured or orphaned wild birds and encourages preservation of their habitat. You'll be treated to an exclusive tour of the facility and be able to get up close and personal with its residents. The tour continues to Potter's Marsh which hosts a large variety of migrant and nesting birds you'll view as you walk along the boardwalk. Muskrats and moose also frequent the marsh year-round; look for them as they forage on the new green growth of spring.

Healthy Parks Healthy People

Anchorage is a community with an amazing system of parks and trails including almost 10,000 acres of municipal parkland; 223 parks, 82 playgrounds and over 250 miles of trails and greenbelts that link neighborhoods with surrounding natural open space and wildlife habitat. Join the Anchorage Parks Foundation on a tour of community led and volunteer based projects throughout the City. You will visit sites of completed and planned park improvement projects developed through the Community Based Asset Management or "Report Card" process which engaged citizens to evaluate and rate their neighborhood parks, raise funds, and construct repairs and improvements. Meet with park advocates who provided the labor, materials and equipment for many projects while the Youth Employment in the Parks program constructed others.

**Government Hill
Threatened Microcosm of
Anchorage's History**

Anchorage's first neighborhood, Government Hill, lies just across Ship Creek from downtown overlooking the

waters of Knik Arm and views of Denali to the Northwest and the military bases to the East. Here you will experience all of the various phases of growth, development and diversity that the City has undergone since being founded on the banks of Ship Creek in 1915. This walking tour will take you to the City's first houses, grocery and strip mall, and remnants of a fox farm from pioneer days. Visit the first completed urban renewal project on the US west coast that required the old Quonset Hut be torn down. Reflect on the Good Friday earthquake of 1964 at the neighborhood park in the hole where the elementary school once stood. Walk through revitalization sites throughout the community.

Experience the economic diversity with the mix of expensive view homes and the largest concentration of low income rental housing in the City; and see cultural diversity evidenced at the Community Gardens and Spanish immersion program at the elementary school. The biggest threat to the Government Hill Community today is the Knik Arm Crossing, infamously called the "Bridge to Nowhere". See firsthand the view of nowhere from the bluff neighborhood at ground zero of bridge and road construction. The neighborhood symbol is a rooster, because we love to crow about Government Hill.

**The Hillside
On the Slopes of Development**

Hillside neighborhoods are built on the slopes of the Chugach Mountains just minutes from city amenities to the west and back country access to Chugach

State Park to the east. Tour the southeast Hillside area which was mostly rural homesteads in the 1950s. As Anchorage grew it has developed into a mosaic of large wooded lots, large lot subdivisions and upscale smaller neighborhoods. Residents value the natural setting and darkness of the winter night sky. You'll see housing ranging from rural log cabins and owner built homes to newer masterpieces which are the highest priced in town. Enjoy for yourself the world class views that stretch from Cook Inlet to the Alaska Range. Discuss with residents the challenges of living on Alaskan mountain slopes including high winds, drainage issues, and treacherous driving conditions. Learn about citizens roles in guiding development of the largest remaining private land in Anchorage including preserving wildlife corridors and creek greenbelts. See community volunteer projects of all shapes. Visit a Chugach State Park trailhead and see the potential for conflict between homeowners and park access advocates and what is being done to balance the needs of both. You may even spot moose and bear wandering through the neighborhoods that can create problems with garbage, landscaping, and vehicle accidents.


Anchorage by Bicycle
