Replace aging play equipment for the toddler age group at Fairbanks Park.

Funding Details:

In 2011 APF fixed the trail, entryway, signage and parking at Fairbanks Park, investing \$43,000 in its renovation. The existing toddler play equipment is unsafe, and this Phase II renovation request is for new equipment and play surfacing.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

In 2006 this Fairview Neighborhood rallied around improving the safety of Fairbanks Park by applying for an APF Challenge Grant. A new fence was installed in 2007, changing the pathway from the nearby liquor store and extinguishing the daytime drinking that had occurred in this park for many years. Volunteers worked many hours during the Fairview Day of Caring, planting roses near the new fence. Since that event neighbors feel the park is safer.

In 2011 APF invested funding in a new entryway, new trash containers, a new parking area, and a resurfaced trail for Fairbanks Park. During that time the contractor on site placed a protective cone on the toddler play equipment. While the jagged item has been removed, the equipment has outlived its useful life and needs removal and replacement.

Neighbors identified new and safe play equipment as a priority on their 2011 Park Report Cards. Neighbors support this request.

Fairbanks Park, Safety Upgrades

Park Report Card Grade: D

The Anchorage Park Foundation (APF) and the Municipality of Anchorage Parks & Recreation Department (APRD) are working together to address need for "fix-its" in small under-served neighborhood parks.

The **Anchorage Parks Report Card** creates a comprehensive picture of the condition of our neighborhood parks, reflecting the Anchorage community's opinions, preferences and ideas. In Fall 2011, Anchorage community volunteers evaluated 51 neighborhood parks based on 6 different settings. Parks were surveyed based on cleanliness, safety, structure, appearance, and function. APRD staff will use this information to strategically employ its funding and volunteer resources to better meet the needs of the Anchorage community.

In Summers 2009-2011, APF and APRD mobilized thousands of parks volunteers to revitalize neighborhood parks by completing community-identified fix-its. This winter, APF and APRD are partnering with Community Councils, park user groups and park neighbors to plan the 2012 and 2013 neighborhood park fix-its.

In 2011, Fairbanks Park received a D on its Report Card. Due to safety concerns, a fence was installed in July 2008 by APF & APRD, and is reported by community members as a very positive first step forward in helping prevent transients from the Gambell area enter the park. However, safety is still the #1 concern for Fairbanks Park. Community members identified pruning the rose shrubs and trees in green areas as a way to improve visibility, creating a safer park environment. They have also identified new and safer play equipment for toddlers to be added to the neighborhood gathering space.

In the summer of 2013, the Anchorage Park Foundation and Parks & Recreation Department will work with parks volunteers to complete neighborhood park fix-its in Fairbanks Park. We invite the Alaska State Legislature to join us in investing in the future of Fairbanks Park and the Northwest community. **The Anchorage Park Foundation will match legislative investment in neighborhood park fix-its with volunteer involvement and generous support from the Rasmuson Foundation's Anchorage Parks Initiative.**

Fairbanks Park Fix It List

- Prune roses and trees to increase visibility due to safety concerns
- Add dog stations and trash containers throughout the park to improve cleanliness
- Upgrade the playground to create welcoming play areas for older children
- Add picnic tables and inviting new plaza to create a new neighborhood gathering place


