Juneau Symphony - 50th Anniversary Celebration

Brief Project Description:

Community wide cultural events hosted by the Juneau Symphony to commemorate their 50th Anniversary and increase community participation in music education and performance in the future.

Funding Details:

The Symphony will raise the remaining \$20,000 through private donations from individuals and business sponsors.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The Juneau Symphony is a volunteer, community orchestra that has performed in Juneau since 1963. Their mission is to give local musicians a platform to perform and develop musically, to provide live, high quality symphonic music for the community, and to offer musical opportunities and support for youth. For their 50th season they will offer a year-long program of new events and projects that are in addition to their regular concerts and outside of their annual operating budget. The goals of these events are to celebrate the Symphony's history, increase community participation in the Symphony, supplement music education in the Juneau school district, and to offer the city of Juneau exceptional, professional performances not normally available in a city of this size.

Funding from the state will allow the Symphony to offer these events at low or no cost to participants. State funding will cover 60% of expenses. The Symphony will raise the remaining 40% through private donations from individuals and business sponsors.

Examples of planned projects are:

- Collaborative project with Juneau School District 4th grade to integrate student photography as a visual component of a Symphony concert. Completed project will be shown to all 4th and 5th grade district students as part of the Symphony's Music in the Schools program and shown in public performances by the Juneau Symphony.
- 50th Anniversary concert with over 100 volunteer performers including the current Juneau Symphony Orchestra and Chorus, all available former Symphony musicians from the last 50 years, student musicians and singers from the Juneau School District, and visiting musicians from other Alaskan communities.
- Free community events including a Marine Park orchestra performance, 4th of July parade participation, a musical 5K/10K

run, and a public community reception to celebrate and acknowledge Symphony participants both past and present, and to recognize our local sponsors.

- Performances by professional artists normally above the Symphony's price range, including the Motown and R&B group SPECTRUM, and Van Cliburn Piano Competition winner, Jon Nakamatsu.

The Juneau Symphony is proud to be Alaska's capital city orchestra and to contribute to Juneau's vibrant arts community. A high concentration of the arts in a city leads to higher civic engagement, more social cohesion, higher graduation rates, higher child welfare, and lower poverty rates. The Juneau Symphony looks forward to celebrating 50 years of success and our bright future.

Project Timeline:

50th Anniversary events will begin in July 2012 and end in June 2013. All expenditures will be complete by September 2013.

The Juneau Symphony has been performing live, classical music in Alaska's capital city since 1963. The organization is planning to celebrate its 50th Anniversary during the entire 2012-2013 concert season with exceptional concerts, community events, and special products. **We are requesting a one time grant of \$30,000 from the 27th Alaska State Legislature to support these activities.**

Here are some of the events we have planned and the costs associated with those activities.

- Orchestra mainstage concert with Motown group, SPECTRUM in June 2013 \$25,000
- Development of a film combining historic Juneau footage with photos taken by 4th grade students, to be shown in conjunction with a mainstage concert in January 2013 \$ 5,500
- Soloist Jon Nakamatsu to open the season in October \$ 10,000
- 50th Anniversary mainstage concert in April 2013 with additional musicians, including alumni from out of state, soloists and additional performances. \$3,500
- Community Events including public reception, 5K/10K run, Marine Park performance and parade \$ 4,000

These costs are in addition to our annual operating budget of \$220,000, which includes five mainstage concert pairs, our youth programs and our Juneau Student Symphony season.

Thank you for considering our request. We are also applying for other grant monies as well as soliciting our regular business and individual donors for additional contributions. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Juneau Symphony and are looking forward to celebrating its success with the community!


I am writing in support of the request from the Juneau Symphony for funding to support a variety of community activities in celebration of their 50th anniversary in the State's Capital.

To Whom It May Concern,

We are writing this letter to request that you give serious consideration to funding the 50th Anniversary request of the Juneau Symphony.

The Juneau Symphony is part of Juneau's economic engine. First, it provides employment in the creative arts and culture sector both through its own staff and also for support contractors such as sound engineers, graphic designers, music teachers and performing artists. As a Juneau based organization it also spends funds locally on everything from advertising to utilities. Additionally, the musicians and audience members generate revenue for local shops and restaurants during every event.

Second, the Symphony plays an important role in making Juneau broadly attractive as a place to live, work and do business. Efforts are underway to attract qualified workers for Greens Creek and Kensington mines and for those employees to relocate their families to Juneau from the Lower 48. Communities with orchestras attract volunteers, voters, philanthropists and other active, civic-minded participants, and the presence of an orchestra can be an indicator of a community's economic development.


Dear Legislator:
