## **Project Description/Justification:**

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designated the Mendenhall Valley area of Juneau, Alaska as a moderate non-attainment area for the National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) for particulate matter with an aerodynamic diameter less than or equal to a nominal 10 micrometers (PM10), upon enactment of the federal Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 (56 FR 56694, November 6, 1991).

Paving of unpaved roads is a focused action to decrease PM10 by decreasing fugitive dust in the valley and is supported by the Limited Maintenance Plan (LMP) for the Mendenhall Valley area of Juneau that the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation produced on February 20, 2009. The LMP states the sources of PM10 in the valley "include residential wood smoke, ball fields and playgrounds, automobile exhaust, and fugitive dust."

This project contributes to the Department's Mission by reducing injuries, fatalities and property damage and by improving the mobility of people and goods.
