Project Description/Justification:

This project will fund the replacement of electronic fingerprint units. The current units are starting to fail and need replacing.

Public Law 92-544 and CFR-2012 title 28 Part 901-Fingerprinting Submission Requirements Section § 901.2 under the National Child Protection Act of 1993 is the statute that requires Federal Bureau of Investigation collection, classifying, preserving, and exchanging identification records.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation, consistent with several legal opinions from the United States Department of Justice, has established the mandatory elements of a state statute enacted under the auspices of Pub. L. 92-544. The state statute must:

- (1) Exist as a result of a legislative enactment;
- (2) Require that the criminal background check be fingerprint-based;
- (3) Authorize the submission of fingerprints to the State Identification Bureau for forwarding to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check.

The Office of Children's Services will not be able to process as many fingerprints or will have to manually ink fingerprints, slowing down the state and Federal Bureau of Investigation background check process.
