Rehabilitate the East Fork Selawik Footbridge #1292 and the West Fork Selawik Footbridge #1401. Work will include repair or replacement of surface boards, install a traction system, repair railing on the access ramps, repair steel cross bracing and foundation repairs.

Project Description/Justification:

The two bridges in Selawik are vital to transportation within the village. The Selawik River is eroding the bridge foundation supports and the increased exposure is compromising the bridge's structural integrity. Surface boards are damaged and the current traction system is old snow machine tracks being used to reduce slipping when wet and icy. The steel piles which support the access ramps leading to the bridges have settled creating an uneven surface. The bridges were built in 1980 and have not had any major maintenance completed since construction.
