Project Description/Justification:

SANCTIONS: Alaska does not have open container and repeat intoxicated driver laws that conform to federal laws (23USC154 and 23USC164). Funding sanctions are imposed because of this. On October 1, 2013 5% of the National Highway Performance Program and Surface Transportation Program funds from MAP-21 are being transferred to the Highway Safety Program (23USC402). A 2.5% penalty is assessed on these programs for Alaska not having an open container law, and 2.5% comes from not having a repeat intoxicated driver law. These penalties decrease the total amount of highway construction funds available to Alaska. The anticipated sanction on October 1, 2013 (FFY2014) is approximately \$21.5 million (100% federal). These sanction penalties provide funds for safety education and highway safety improvements.

Funds can be used for various types of safety projects. Past projects have included advance warning flashers, reflective pavement markers, pedestrian countdown timers, and rumble strips.

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
