## **Brief Summary and Statement of Need:**

The state's transportation assets are regularly damaged by natural weather occurrences, such as ice jams, floods, earthquakes, slope failures, wind storms and heavy snows. When these unforeseen events occur, repairs to the state's highways, airports, and facilities are needed immediately to restore transportation service to communities and to minimize disruptions to commerce. These funds would be used to pay for remedial commodities and contracting costs that are not eligible for federal reimbursement. The immediate response allowed by these funds would provide a major benefit to Alaska residents and communities impacted by these unforeseen events.

These funds can be used to meet imminent failure needs caused by extended deferred maintenance or in assets that are well past their design life and where failure is imminent. Examples would be the replacement of a major highway cross culvert where failure is imminent and the failure could result in a prolonged closure of a major highway. Other examples of an imminent failure include imminent slope failures and/or areas of accelerated erosion adjacent to a highway, airport, or building that requires immediate stabilization to prevent damage to the state's asset.
