- On September 30, 2019, DEED released a new online data portal for Alaska's families entitled The Compass: A Guide to Alaska's Public Schools. The purpose of the online portal is to provide Alaska's families with important information about their child's school so they can make the best decisions for their child's educational experience.
- Adopted Science Standards for Alaska, Computer Science Standards, and Digital Literacy Standards;
- Submitted and began implementation of the Strengthening Career and Technical Education in the 21st Century Act Transition Plan (Carl D. Perkins) to the Office of Career, Technical and Adult Education (OCTAE).
- Held the second statewide School Safety and Well-Being summit which brought together school safety leadership from 37 districts as well as key educational stakeholders from other agencies to acquire new best practices and to share effective existing school safety practices with an emphasis on restorative disciplinary practices, positive school climate, school crisis preparedness, and trauma informed schools.
- Continued implementation of a new system of school and district designations based upon the state's plan for Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) with the following emphasis Comprehensive Support and Improvement (Lowest 5%), Comprehensive Support and Improvement (Graduation Rate<67%), and Targeted Support and Improvement (Subgroups) schools. This also included a formal review of 37 small schools with limited data and unable to be considered in the larger designation system.</p>
- The department continued to support a collection of new statutes requiring training for district personnel after the Alaska Safe Children's Act Taskforce identified the department's eLearning program as the best mechanism to deliver educator training on suicide prevention, drug and alcohol prevention/disabilities, dating violence, sexual assault, and sexual abuse training. State and national experts gathered to update content to meet these new requirements. The trainings were updated and delivered to thousands of educators statewide at no cost to districts.
- Completed and released "Transforming Schools: A Framework for Trauma Engaged Practice in Alaska." This
 innovative framework focuses on transforming schools by supporting the whole student and integrating
 trauma-engaged practices.
- DEED was awarded a Trauma Recovery Demonstration Grant for \$5 million to deliver trauma-specific services to low income, academically struggling students who have experienced trauma.
- DEED was awarded a Comprehensive Literacy State Development Grant for \$6 million to advance literacy skills, pre-literacy skills, reading, and writing for children from birth through grade 12.

Continued Implementation of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) State Plan and School Accountability System

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was passed by Congress and signed by the President in December 2015. ESSA reauthorizes the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) and replaces No Child Left Behind (NCLB) and Alaska's NCLB Flexibility Waiver. Under ESSA, each state education agency is required to submit a plan detailing the implementation of the law to ensure equity in education across public schools in their state.

Alaska's plan to implement ESSA was approved by the U.S. Department of Education on May 16, 2018. Alaska's State Board of Education subsequently approved regulations proposed by DEED implementing Alaska's ESSA plan on May 31, 2018. The development of Alaska's plan included significant outreach by DEED to collect feedback, including over a year and a half of input from more than 4,000 stakeholders through online surveys, discussion groups and webinars, community conversations, and an ESSA advisory committee.

DEED will continue seeking input and recommendations from all Alaskans as requirements under ESSA are implemented. Most recently DEED has assisted districts in development of per pupil spending reporting requirements.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Alignment of DEED work to the Alaska's Education Challenge five measurable goals;
- Providing support for all students to read at grade level by the end of 3rd grade;
- Implement the Trauma Recovery Demonstration and Comprehensive Literacy State Development grants;
- Providing support to increase career, technical, and culturally relevant education to meet student and workforce needs:
- Providing support for tribal compacting;
- Providing support to close the achievement gap by ensuring equitable educational rigor and resources;
- Providing support to prepare, attract, and retain effective education professionals;
- Providing support to improve the safety and well-being of students through school partnerships with families, communities, and tribes;
- Continued implementation of Alaska's ESSA plan, including outreach to stakeholders regarding new accountability reporting requirements; and
- Continued support to districts and school board members as they prepare to report per-pupil spending by school starting in the 2018-19 school year as part of ESSA.

Alaska Statute 14.09.010 establishes a grant program to school districts that operate pupil transportation
programs. The annual grant entitlement is determined by multiplying the per student grant amount by the actual
number of Average Daily Membership (ADM) in the district.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

In FY2019, the Department of Education and Early Development distributed approximately \$77,344.7 to 48 school districts transporting students to and from school daily.

Key Component Challenges

Continuing to find cost effective means of providing transportation services is a key issue to school districts, as well as finding training opportunities for rural bus drivers and ensuring student safety through bus driver training, school bus inspections, and drug and alcohol testing of bus drivers.

 The district receives foundation funds for the students enrolled. FY2019 projection: \$499.0. The Department
 provides funding for the residential program through a Reimbursable Services Agreement with the Department of
 Health and Social Services. FY2020 Projection: \$490.6. Students from outside Anchorage are housed in group
 and foster homes while they attend school. 4 AAC 33.070

- The Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner served on numerous committees, including the Governor's Opioid Task Force, working to combat the opioid crisis in Alaska; the Governor's Homelessness Task Force, addressing the homelessness issues in our state; the Governor's Tribal Advisory Council, working on tribal issues in Alaska; the Alaska Early Childhood Coordinating Council, working to promote positive development, improved health outcomes, and school readiness for children; the Alaska Workforce Investment Board (AWIB), working to develop a workforce system that is useful, accessible, and understandable to the state's customers; and the Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, working to build an Alaska freed from domestic and sexual violence.

Add authority for the State Board of Education (SBOE) to move to a formal monthly meeting schedule and related additional administrative support position to arrange public notices, minutes, travel, and other support functions.

The SBOE has broad authority over the management and strategic direction of the Department of Education and Early Development. The SBOE has periodic status updates on department activities and regular quarterly meetings, most of which are telephonic. This does not allow the SBOE much opportunity to discuss and guide the department in achieving its mission. The long amount of time between formal quarterly meetings means that ideas and initiatives started by the department are often significantly underway before there is an opportunity to seek guidance from or update the board. Additionally, the amount of information to be disseminated at the quarterly meetings can be excessive, making it difficult to focus on any one issue. The SBOE also serves as the school board for Mt. Edgecumbe High School (MEHS) in Sitka, and current meeting schedules and travel budget diminish the opportunity for interaction between the board and MEHS leadership. Moving to a formal monthly meeting schedule, alternating months in person, allows the SBOE to have a more informed and productive role in department activities and strategic planning. This increase also gives the board better opportunities to engage with MEHS.

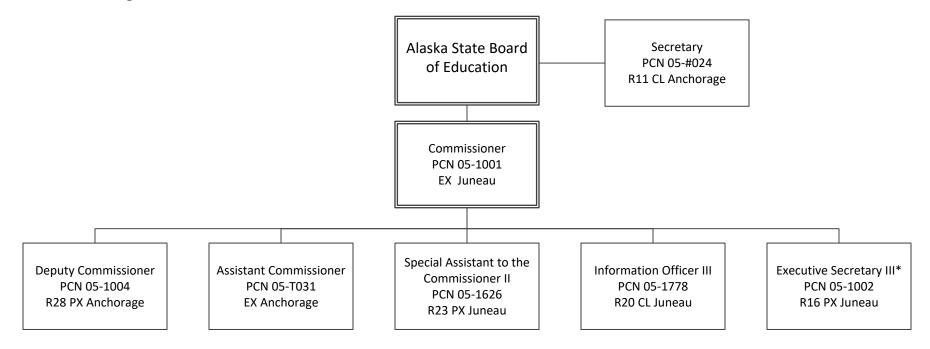

Core Services

This component provides centralized administrative services to the department through the coordination of
various functions such as budget preparation and execution, federal and state financial reporting, accounting,
procurement, contract administration, leasing, property control, human resources, payroll, travel, and other
administrative responsibilities in accordance with federal laws, state statutes and regulations.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Effectively managed the appropriations and allocations established by session law to implement the budget and successfully close out the fiscal year while meeting the obligations of the department; and
- On-going participation in statewide initiatives, including Shared Services of Alaska, the Office of Information Technology and Facility Services.

Key Component Challenges

The Administrative Services component provides efficient and timely administrative, financial, budgetary, and procurement support services to the department; however, the statewide financial management database, the Integrated Resource Information System (IRIS), and the statewide financial reporting system, ALDER, continues to challenge the workload, processes, and resources for financial, procurement, and human resource needs. In addition, continued development and implementation of statewide Shared Services of Alaska initiatives will have a significant impact on business processes now and in the foreseeable future, and have and on the department's ability to maintain expected service levels to the department staff and stakeholders.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Through the continued implementation of IRIS, Administrative Services will continue to analyze the financial and procurement processes, as well as the human resource processes, to find the most efficient, effective and streamlined methods of service delivery. In addition, the department will continue the process of moving select back office functions, including travel and accounts payable to the Shared Services Division within the Department of Administration.

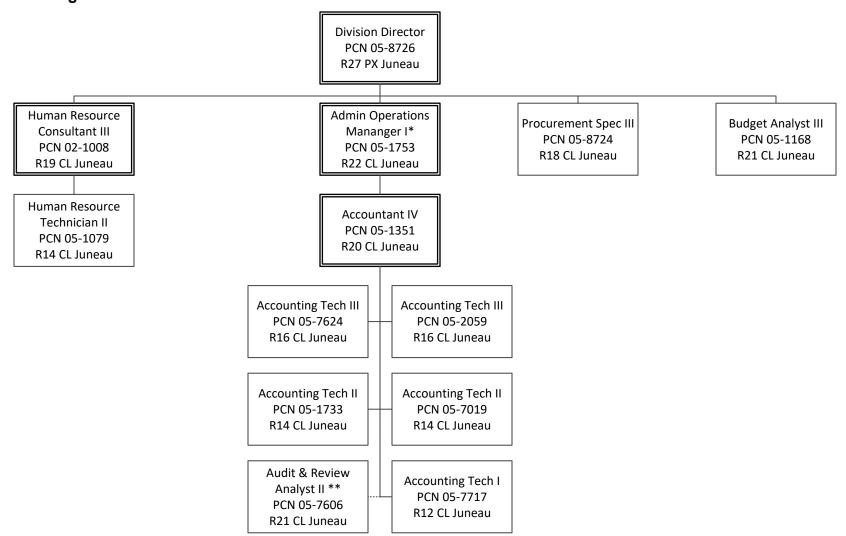

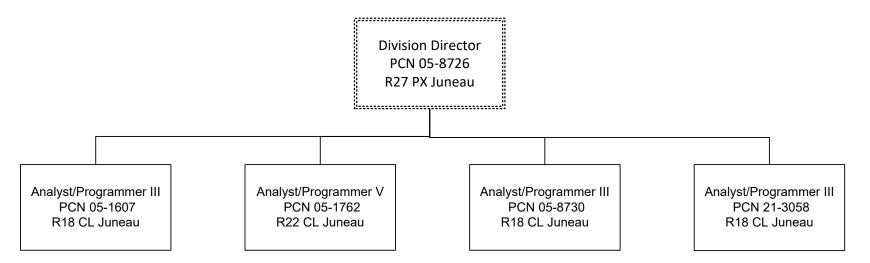

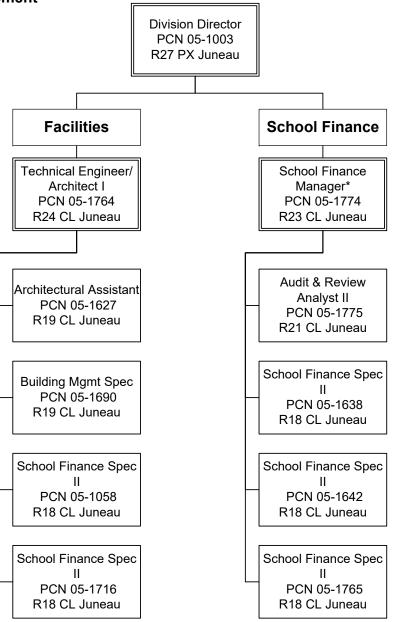

Contribution to Department's Mission

To support student health, learning and academic achievement through several federally funded child nutrition programs that provide nutritious meals to children and students participating in food programs throughout Alaska. Programs: National School Lunch Program (NSLP); School Breakfast Program (SBP); Summer Food Service Program (SFSP); Child and Adult Care Food Programs (CACFP); Fresh Fruit & Vegetable Program (FFVP), USDA Foods Program, (formerly Commodity Food Distribution); and the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP).

Core Services

- · Federal program funding and compliance
- Active Partnerships

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Received reallocation funding by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to support Farm-to-School activities for districts and child care programs statewide. The reallocated funds were also used to reimburse school districts for administrative costs related to USDA Community Foods;
- Received grant funding from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to promote nutrition and
 physical education in Alaska schools over the course of five years. Partnering with the Department of Health
 and Social Services to implement the Student Health and Academic Achievement grant;
- Received grant funding from USDA for the Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) to provide culinary training for CACFP cooks over the course of two years;
- Significant increase in USDA Commodity Foods received in Alaska due to USDA Trade Mitigation purchases;
- Equipment grants were distributed to school districts through a competitive grant process;
- Waivers were approved by USDA to support meal programs operating during school closures as a result of the November 30, 2018 earthquake, as well as additional waivers to support the Summer Meals Programs; and
- 53% of all schools are providing universal free breakfast and lunch programs.

Key Component Challenges

- Expanding federal child nutrition and food commodity programs participation throughout Alaska in the face of the challenges inherent in remote program delivery and increased federal regulatory requirements;
- Providing additional federal resources, training, and technical assistance to food program sponsors to operate
 affordable nutrition and USDA Food commodity programs, and improving sponsor oversight and integrity
 across all of the federal food programs;
- Increased audit and monitoring requirements for school districts;
- The Alaska Farm to School Program was cut, restored, and reduced by the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Agriculture, so this program is being reestablished within the Department of Education and Early Development; and
- Managing increased supply of USDA Commodity Foods as a result of USDA Trade Mitigation purchases.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Draft regulations have been promulgated by USDA addressing the following:

- State Agency requirements to issue fines and penalties to program operators with egregious compliance issues or risk facing fines from USDA at the state level;
- Requirement of all school districts to take procurement training on an annual basis;
- Increased State Agency monitoring requirements for program operators with management issues as defined by USDA;

- Require that general funds be used to pay claims if appeal hearings do not meet federal timeframes; and,
- Federal Child Nutrition Reauthorization is overdue (expired September 2015); significant program changes are anticipated in the next reauthorization.

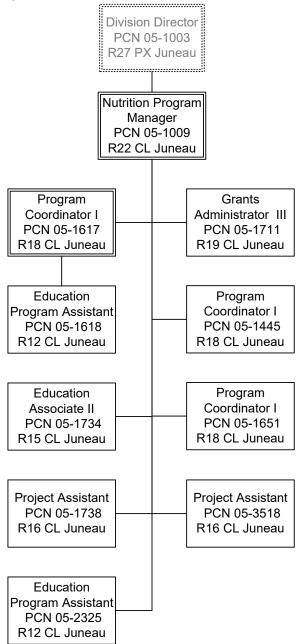

Contribution to Department's Mission

To provide resources to school districts to ensure that special populations of students meet the state's high academic standards; to improve performance through professional development, school accountability, standards, and assessments, improved health, safety, and alternative education opportunities; and, to provide school districts and stakeholders with high quality information to aid in data driven decision-making processes and reporting.

Core Services

- Academic standards, academic assessments and accountability
- Federal program funding and compliance.
- School Effectiveness Programs Assist school districts by providing programs, technical on-site and distance-delivery support, and early intervention services in efforts to increase the statewide graduation rate.
- Active Partnerships Provide opportunities for, and collaborate with government entities, and other public and private organizations to engage in Active Partnerships in pursuit of state educational goals.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- U.S Department of Education Approval of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) state plan application;
- Continued successful federal grant reviews, allocation awards, and monitored 11 federal and state programs across 53 districts;
- Adopted Science Standards for Alaska, Computer Science Standards, and Digital Literacy Standards;
- Created and began implementing awareness activities for the newly adopted standards;
- Submitted and began implemented the Strengthening Career and Technical Education in the 21st Century Act Transition Plan (Carl D. Perkins) to the Office of Career, Technical and Adult Education (OCTAE);
- Continued implementation of Alaska's Education Challenge;
- Completed the second year of School Designation calculations for the System of School Success (Alaska's ESSA accountability system as outlined in the State ESSA Plan);
- Continued implementing the Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) in collaboration with the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education, the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, and Alaska school districts:
- Successfully awarded and completed over 3,000 federal grant awards, grant payments, and Child Nutrition program reimbursements;
- Expanded eLearning course offerings and availability of mandatory trainings that supports school district
 personnel statewide. The eLearning platform includes tens of thousands of eLearning transcripts and
 accounts. The eLearning system increases school district capacity to provide consistent high quality
 professional development in a way that is a cost-saving measure for the state.
- The department continued to support a collection of new statutes requiring training for district personnel after the Alaska Safe Children's Act Taskforce identified the department's eLearning program as the best mechanism to deliver educator training on suicide prevention, drug and alcohol prevention/disabilities, dating violence, sexual assault, and sexual abuse training. State and national experts gathered to update content to meet these new requirements. The trainings were updated and delivered to thousands of educators statewide at no cost to districts.
- Completed the final year of implementation of Project AWARE federal grant. This grant focused on providing mental health and resiliency supports to students attending alternative high schools in Mat-Su, Anchorage, and Kenai. This initiative reconnected students on the verge on dropping out to their goal of graduation and delivered thousands of life-saving and life changing interventions to Alaska's most vulnerable students.
- Completed and released "Transforming Schools: A Framework for Trauma Engaged Practice in Alaska." This
 innovative framework focuses on transforming schools by supporting the whole student and integrating
 trauma-engaged practices.
- DEED was awarded a Trauma Recovery Demonstration Grant for \$5 million to deliver trauma-specific services to low income, academically struggling students who have experienced trauma.

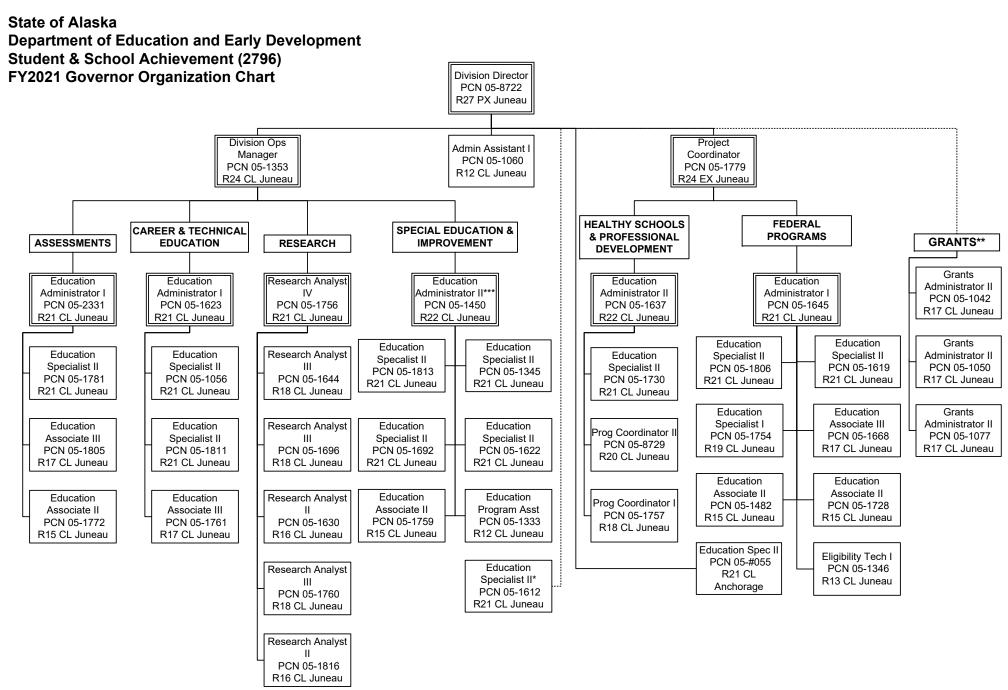

Component: State System of Support

Contribution to Department's Mission

The mission of the State System of Support (SSoS) is to support school districts as they build their capacity to implement sustainable school improvement strategies with fidelity that ensure an excellent education for every student every day.

Core Services

- School Effectiveness Programs Assist school districts by providing programs, technical on-site and distance-delivered support, and early intervention services in efforts to increase the statewide graduation rate and student performance indicators.
- Fiscal Accountability, Compliance and Oversight Ensure the department effectively and efficiently manages state, federal and other funding by providing comprehensive fiscal and administrative services.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Maintained a system for school improvement planning based upon the domains and indicators of the Alaska Effective Schools Framework (Curriculum, Assessment, Instruction, Supportive Learning Environment, Professional Development, and Leadership) and local school and district engagement in the online diagnosis and action planning tool Alaska STEPP (Steps Toward Educational Progress and Partnership);
- Implemented a new system of school and district designations based upon the state's plan for Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) with the following emphasis – Comprehensive Support and Improvement (Lowest 5%), Comprehensive Support and Improvement (Graduation Rate<67%), and Targeted Support and Improvement (Subgroups) schools. This also included a formal review of 37 small schools with limited data and unable to be considered in the larger designation system;
- During the 2018-2019 school year, DEED supported 104 designated CSI and TSI schools with improvement planning;
- Twelve contracted school improvement coaches served 15 schools with monthly site visits and distance support for implementation of school improvement plans and focus on systems change at the school level;
- Multi-year School Improvement Grants continue to be awarded to six schools through a competitive process.
 School improvement funds were distributed to 101 CSI and TSI schools to support implementation of the local School Improvement Plan; and
- Worked with partner organizations to support technical assistance conferences such as the January Anchorage Response to Intervention/Multi-Tiered Support System (RTI/MTSS) conference, the Alaska State Development Network (ASDN) Summer Leadership Institute, and the annual May Alaska School Leadership Academy (ASLI).

Key Component Challenges

- Academic growth and proficiency for all students in reading, writing and math, and improving the graduation rate, as identified by the state's ESSA plan;
- Assisting districts and schools in determining and selecting "evidence-based interventions" as determined by ESSA;
- Maintain departmental structures, capacity, and resource base to support schools and districts in full
 implementation of all Alaska standards, staff evaluation systems, research-based instructional practices,
 positive behavioral instructional support systems, and community-based schooling;
- Providing dependable and established support to school and district improvement efforts;
- Maintaining support for implementation of all Alaska standards, including alignment and implementation of curriculum, instructional best practices, and formative and summative assessments;
- Continuing to sponsor professional development for the implementation of the content standards; and
- Districts and schools will seek assistance and support from the department in implementing aspects of ESSA, including asserting local control over issues most pertinent to their locale.

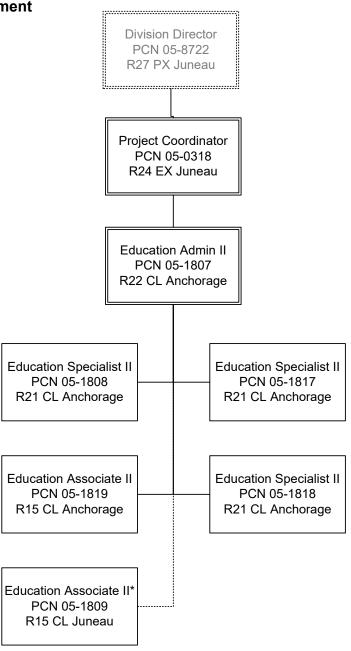

Component: Teacher Certification

Contribution to Department's Mission

To ensure that only qualified applicants are certified to teach in Alaska and that teacher education programs in Alaska conform to nationally recognized standards.

Core Services

· Accountability and oversight

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Consistently completed the processing of the thousands of applications for initial certification or renewal of certification in less than two weeks of receipt of applications;
- Revised most of the teacher certification applications, checklists, and website pages so that they are ADA compliant;
- Supported the University of Alaska Fairbanks and the University of Alaska Anchorage's teacher preparation
 program during their first accreditation visits by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation
 (CAEP);
- Increased certification pathways through regulatory changes; and
- Provided technical assistance to school districts as the state transitioned from the NCLB to the ESSA definitions of educator quality.

Key Component Challenges

- Attracting and retaining teachers in most of Alaska school districts continues to be difficult;
- Some statutory and regulatory certification requirements are seen as barriers to attracting more people to the teaching profession in Alaska;
- Teacher certification database and document management systems are outdated and inefficient; and
- Transitioned from the highly qualified requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind act (NCLB) to the
 endorsement focused requirements of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) has highlighted the limitations
 of the teacher certification data collection and management system.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Update teacher certification website to increase transparency for our customers and the public;
- Consolidate and expand online services:
- Upgrade or replace the teacher certification unit's document management system;
- Continue to work with stakeholders to develop additional pathways to Alaska certification;
- Examine internal protocols and where possible simplify submission and processing of applications; and

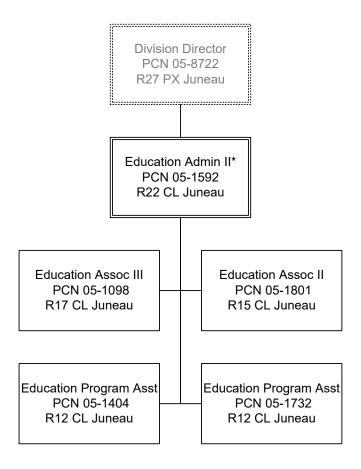

Component: Early Learning Coordination

Contribution to Department's Mission

The Early Learning Coordination component supports services and grants that provide locally designed comprehensive child development programs encompassing all aspects of a child's development and learning, with a focus on school readiness. Major targets within Early Learning Coordination include: Head Start Grants, Alaska Pre-Elementary Grants, Preschool Health and Safety, Best Beginnings, Parents as Teachers, Early Literacy, Early Childhood and Kindergarten Assessment and coordination of the Alaska Early Childhood Advisory Council (AECCC).

All programs under the Early Learning Component utilize partnerships and community collaborations to build upon school readiness.

Core Services

- · Federal program funding and compliance
- Active partnerships

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Continues to receive a grant from the federal Department of Health and Human Services to support Head Start Collaboration in the state.
- Continued to award funding for Pre-Elementary programming to 10 school districts who previously received Moore Settlement funds.
- Supported Head Start Grantees Early Learning expanded and enhanced the outreach and technical support for Head Start programs. The department worked closely to support the Alaska Head Start Association with monthly meetings as well as quarterly face-to-face gatherings. The department supported a face-to-face meeting with grantees to receive feedback towards the creation of an equitable and geographically weighted formula for disbursement of future state funds. Enhanced Professional Development for Early Childhood Leaders. Early Learning connected with school district grantees to support leadership with quality preschool programs and designed a yearlong professional learning series to build understanding of quality practices for school leaders. School leaders participated in quarterly meetings.
- The department supports the statewide use of the observation-based assessment My Teaching Strategies.
 Head Start and School District Pre-Elementary programs helped to create the Alaska CLIMBS guidelines to
 inform teachers on how to utilize observations in lesson planning and guide administrators on sharing data
 with stakeholders.
- Provided grant funds to the Alaska State Libraries allowing the libraries to continue their subscriptions of Sesame Street Ebooks and Tumblebooks. 41,136 Tumblebooks were read in the first year.

Key Component Challenges

- Ongoing difficulties implementing quality pre-elementary services due to uncertainty of program funding.
 Program results consistently show child achievement, however a limited number of students in the state have access to quality pre-elementary services. Approximately 10% of Alaska preschool aged children have access to state or federally funded pre-elementary programs.
- Academic growth and proficiency for all students in reading, writing and math, and improving the graduation
 rate by increasing the number of children arriving at Kindergarten ready to learn and ready for school, and
 increasing the number of schools ready for their local children and families. 32.57% of students consistently
 met 11 of the 13 goals of the Alaska Developmental Profile upon Kindergarten Entry. Supporting district
 superintendents and leadership with implementing and supporting young learners in school wide systems;
 and
- High staff turnover and lack of qualified staff to provide consistent high quality early learning.

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Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

School Readiness Pre-Elementary Programs

- Received a Pre-School Development Grant (PDG) from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services
 that allows for collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS), Head Start, and the
 network of Early Learning providers.
- Maintain or expand the number of children served in both district supported pre-elementary programs and Head Start. Expansion numbers will be based on the FY2019 total number of children served.
- Work in collaboration with other DEED component teams to support equitable access to high quality early learning programs.
- Continue with the implementation of Alaska's early learning statewide assessment systems to identify key
 areas for measurable outcomes in early development. Develop and maintain accurate count numbers for
 children receiving pre-elementary services in Alaska.
- Revision of the Alaska Early Learning Guidelines to more closely align with the current Alaska Standards by
 distributing core documents, providing training development, secondary document development, and local
 and regional training in conjunction with the PDG grant.

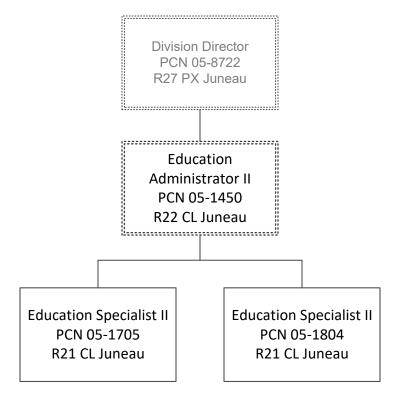

Component: Pre-Kindergarten Grants

Contribution to Department's Mission

The Alaska Pre-Kindergarten Program (Pre-K) provides a voluntary, comprehensive, half-day preschool program for four- and young five-year olds (five-year old children who do not meet the cutoff date for Kindergarten entry) through school districts, based on the guiding principles and goals set forth in the Alaska Early Learning Guidelines. The Pre-Kindergarten grants focus on improving standards, assessments, and accountability for early childhood education programs by developing active partnerships between families, schools, and community based entities.

Core Services

· Active partnerships

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Expanded Quality Pre-Elementary Programs: Early Learning revised the Alaska Pre-Elementary Grants to meet the needs of current grantees by developing locally designed pre-elementary programs and/or supporting existing early learning programs in their districts.
- Eleven grants were awarded for the 2018-2019 school year. Programs ranged from classrooms in school districts, collaborations with existing Head Start or licensed childcare, and home-based programming.

Key Component Challenges

- Ongoing difficulties implementing quality pre-elementary services due to unsustainability of program funding.
 Program results consistently show child achievement, however a limited number of students in the state have access to quality pre-elementary services;
- Academic growth and proficiency for all students in reading, writing, and math, and improving the graduation
 rate by increasing the number of children arriving at Kindergarten ready to learn and ready for school, and
 increasing the number of schools ready for their local children and families;
- Refine state standards and assessments to demonstrate the needs of young learners;
- Maintain or expand the number of children served, based on the total number of children served; and,
- Expand partnership work to include collaborative data-driven decision making based on the use of common child outcome assessment and the expansion of early childhood collaboration efforts; and,
- Providing ongoing support for the nine school districts who received funding from the FY2019 \$6 million multi-year legislative appropriation.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

School Readiness Pre-Elementary Programs

- Maintain or expand the number of children served equitably in a quality program in both district supported pre-elementary programs and Head Start. Expansion numbers will be based on the FY2018 total number of children served;
- Work in collaboration with other DEED component teams to address the goals for the department set forward by Alaska's Education Challenge and other statewide initiatives;
- Continue with the implementation of Alaska's early learning statewide assessment systems to identify key
 areas for measurable outcomes in early development. Develop and maintain accurate count numbers for
 children receiving pre-elementary services in Alaska; and
- Work in collaboration with early learning partners and stakeholders to define "kindergarten ready" and work from a shared understanding of it.

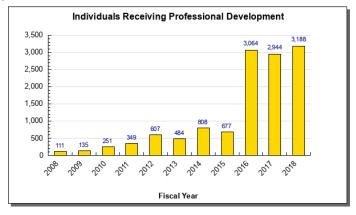

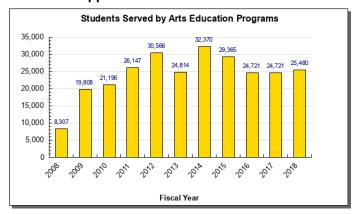

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

Alaska State Council on the Arts – Public Corporation HB137

House Bill 137 (CH16, SLA2017) designating the Alaska State Council on the Arts (ASCA) as a public corporation and instrumentality of the state was approved unanimously in the house and senate in April 2017 and became law on July 1, 2017.

A restructured ASCA will allow the agency to grow and meet the increasing needs of an arts community poised to become a robust arts industry. ASCA will continue to be housed within the Alaska's Department of Education and Early Development, but its new structure will provide the agency greater flexibility. As a public corporation, ASCA is not subject to the State's Personnel Act or Procurement Act, but in place of those requirements, the agency will adopt policies and procedures which conform to the laws and ethics that govern these organizational functions. Partnerships, along with state and federal funding will continue to support ASCA's grants and programs according to the strategic plan and current regulations.

As ASCA transitions to this new structure in FY2018, programs will undergo evaluations and planning that will be informed, thoughtful, and based on ASCA's mission and strategic goals.

License Plate SB 154

Senate Bill 154, authorizing ASCA to sell an artist-designed license plate, was signed by Governor Walker in June 2016. In FY2017, ASCA administered a design competition and public vote for an arts license plate that captures the excitement and creative energies of Alaska. The winner will be announced in November 2017. The plate will cost \$50, with a portion of revenues, after production cost, going to support programs of the ASCA. The competition will be held every four years.

Alaska Native Arts

In FY2015, ASCA partnered with The Cook Inlet Regional, Inc. (CIRI) Foundation (TCF), the nonprofit arm of the Cook Inlet Native tribal corporation, to research and develop a professional business development workbook for Alaska Native artists. In addition to resources such as business development, writing an artist statement and resume, the workbook offers specific guidelines for using traditional Native materials in artwork that is sold in the marketplace. In Phase 2 of the partnership, the workbook was utilized in a series of workshops provided by ASCA in Dillingham, Nome and Ketchikan. These workshops continue to be offered across the state in host rural communities. ASCA regularly travels to rural communities to present Rural Arts Professional Development workshops, which primarily benefit extremely rural and Alaska Native artists. These workshops provide tools for marketing, utilizing technology and social media, as well as information on how they can find funding and other types of support. ASCA provided a series of intensive workshop programming in partnership with the Sealaska Heritage Institute, the National Endowment for the Arts for Lemon Creek Correctional Center incarcerated artists, halfway house residents and

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low-income artists in FY2017. The workbook was distributed as the core curriculum at all workshops provided in FY2016 and FY2017.

In FY2016, ASCA and TCF partnered to fund a unique pilot program. Designed to ASCA's Alaska Native Leadership cohort recommendations, the experimental program invested directly in ASCA's Alaska Native Arts Leadership cohort's professional development and underwrote community capacity building through the delivery of art-making opportunities to four rural Alaska communities. This programming, partnership and grant making has been repeated for the FY2017 year.

ASCA Leadership cohort members were invited to submit proposals to develop, organize, and implement an art-making workshop within their home community. A total of eight unique proposals (four in FY2016 and four in FY2017) were awarded funding through an adjudicated process to support Leader cohort honoraria and art workshop materials.

Arts Education and Munartet Project

In 2014, ASCA was approached by the Margaret A Cargill Foundation (MACF), to work with ASCA on a 10-year initiative for arts education teacher preparedness.

In FY2016, ASCA began The Munartet Project: Teaching and Learning in and Through the Arts and Culture in Kodiak, funded by the Margaret A. Cargill Philanthropies (MACP). In partnership with the Kodiak Island Borough School District, the Munartet Project serves to increase pre-service and early career teacher confidence and competence to teach in and through arts and culture. The first cohort of teachers participating in the project has been identified, and began working through the Munartet Project in late summer of 2016. In FY2018, the Munartet Project will have completed its first two years of implementation, and ASCA has applied to the MACP for the next three years of implementation. The partnership includes pre-service and early career cohorts supported by the 4 partners: Kodiak Island Borough School District (KIBSD), Kodiak College-University of Alaska, the Alutiig Museum and Kodiak Arts Council. The project is supporting a certified Arts & Culture Coordinator position through KIBSD, and the Munartet Learning Community, which consists of mentor teachers and administrators, teaching artists, culture bearers and elders along with the pre-service and early career cohorts. In the first school year of implementation (2016-2017), 5 early career teachers (years 1-5 of practice) and 11 mentor teachers were identified and inducted into the project, and 9 pre-service teachers were identified and inducted into the project. In the second year of implementation, to date for the 2017-2018 school year, the early career cohort has grown to include 7 teachers in KIBSD and 13 pre-service cohort members. These cohort members receive support including professional development, course work, arts and culture experiences, coaching and mentoring with the intended outcomes that, "Kodiak teachers will feel supported, confident and competent to teach in and through the arts and culture as they develop in their profession." and that "More local Kodiak residents will pursue teaching as a viable and attractive career option." While the center of this project is the cohort of early career and pre-service teachers, the activities of the Munartet Project are serving a wider group of KIBSD teachers and their classrooms through the development and provision of arts and culture curriculum and resources, in-service engagement, and other opportunities made available by the Munartet partners.

Collective Approaches to Arts Education

An additional component of ASCA's work, including funds from multiple sources, was identified through work with the Munartet Project: "The partnership will provide meaningful input towards ASCA's goal of reimagining its scope and role to represent, support and advance the creative endeavors of citizens and agencies throughout Alaska." To date, since FY2016, this work has included convening Alaskans around the idea of Collective Approaches to Arts Education, developing a community adaptive change approach led by a standing Arts Education Advisory Community, and the development of a framework of goals and Theory of Change around the idea that more Alaskans will have access to teaching and learning in and through the arts and culture in Alaska when partnerships and coalitions support community and school efforts.

New and Strengthened Partnerships

• In FY2017, ASCA was selected as one of 12 sites in the nation to hold a summit in partnership with Joint Base Elmendorf as part of the National Endowment for the Arts' initiative, "Creative Forces", which supports healing and the arts for service members with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and traumatic brain

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- injury. The summit is scheduled for February 21-22, 2018.
- The Anchorage Economic Development Corporation (AEDC) is another strong partner with ASCA. Their Live Work Play initiative has a Creative Placemaking (CP) area of focus, and the ASCA Executive Director serves as its co-chair. This initiative is a multi-sector approach to making Anchorage the #1 city to Live Work and Play by 2025. Anchorage does not have a local arts agency (LAA)—one of the few communities in Alaska without one—so the AEDC CP committee and ASCA are working to implement a LAA that is innovative and dynamic, positioned squarely at the nexus of the economic and community development. The project has received financial support from the city and the mayor supports the creation of this public/private entity.
- ASCA's collaboration with TCF on the Alaska Native Arts Workbook and Art Shops has resulted in great interest in TCF continuing to expand ASCA's services to their shareholders.
- In the past, ASCA has funded Sealaska Heritage Institute for operating support. In FY2016, they received ASCA's National Endowment for the Arts Folk and Traditional Arts Infrastructure Grant, which opened the door for a stronger partnership that has evolved into professional development and artist training for incarcerated individuals in FY2017.

Percent for Art and the Contemporary Art Bank

- ASCA manages the state Percent for Art program, which includes the Contemporary Art Bank, a program
 created to achieve two primary goals: to expose more Alaskans to high quality work by contemporary Alaskan
 artists through the lending of original art to public offices throughout Alaska, and to provide support to
 professional artists in Alaska through the purchase of their work. In FY2017 ASCA processed 153 loans for
 the Contemporary Art Bank. This collection of artwork made by living Alaskan artists is available for two-year
 loans to state buildings and public offices.
- ASCA managed 5 public art commissions through the State of Alaska's Percent for Art contracts, and
 informally advised on four other projects. In addition to working with a variety of partners to manage Percent
 for Art commissions, ASCA also receives contract revenue from the University of Alaska system and the
 Anchorage Airport for the management of their public art programs. In FY2017, this revenue supported a
 contractor to administer projects because the Fine Arts Administrator position was vacant for the fiscal year.

Key Component Challenges

- To meet increasing demand for grants and programs in all regions of the state, while also serving as the voice of cultural policy for Alaska;
- The arts are in a turbulent time, and the ways in which citizens and communities want to participate in the arts is changing drastically. ASCA is leading an effort to help arts organizations respond to these changes and remain sustainable and fiscally viable, while also expanding their reach and service to their communities. With limited state and federal funds, this effort is conducted largely through convenings, professional development and consultations;
- To expand the Arts in Education program by utilizing a Collective Impact approach to supporting school, district and education priorities through targeted, strategic grant investments; and
- To help Alaskan artists have economically viable careers through promoting Alaskan artists and their work through the Silver Hand and Made in Alaska initiatives. To provide artists, arts organizations and creative industries with business and professional development opportunities.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

With a new strategic plan in place, ASCA intends to evaluate its arts education grants and also re-envision its grant programs so that they can better serve the arts sector and the state, as well as to streamline processes for maximum efficiency. ASCA currently has 12 grant programs that are managed by three ASCA program officers (one position is currently vacant). By re-conceptualizing the approach to public investment in the arts, ASCA will utilize limited dollars more efficiently, while maximizing the impact of the support for ASCA grantees.

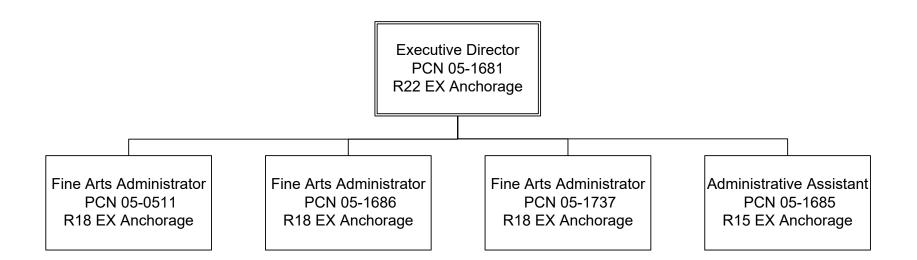

Replace Public School Trust Fund (PSTF) authority with unrestricted general fund (UGF) to maximize the earning potential of the PSTF. Funding Mt. Edgecumbe Boarding School operating expenses with UGF does not represent an increase in UGF spending. The PSTF authority previously used in this component now offsets an equal value of UGF deposits into the Public Education Fund (PEF). The increased flexibility in management of the PSTF resulting from this action increases future earning potential of the PSTF and reduces reliance on UGF for deposits into the PEF.

This change is necessary to provide the Department of Revenue, Treasury Division, investment flexibility to earn maximum return. A single annual draw from PSTF at the same time each year provides Treasury with predictable cash flow to plan investments. Currently, PSTF is appropriated directly to pay foundation payments and for operational costs at MEHS. These direct appropriations are not as predictable as a single draw meaning that Treasury must reserve a larger portion of the fund at all times to ensure sufficient cash on hand to meet expenditures. A single deposit into the PEF solves this issue and increases the long term earning potential of the PSTF.

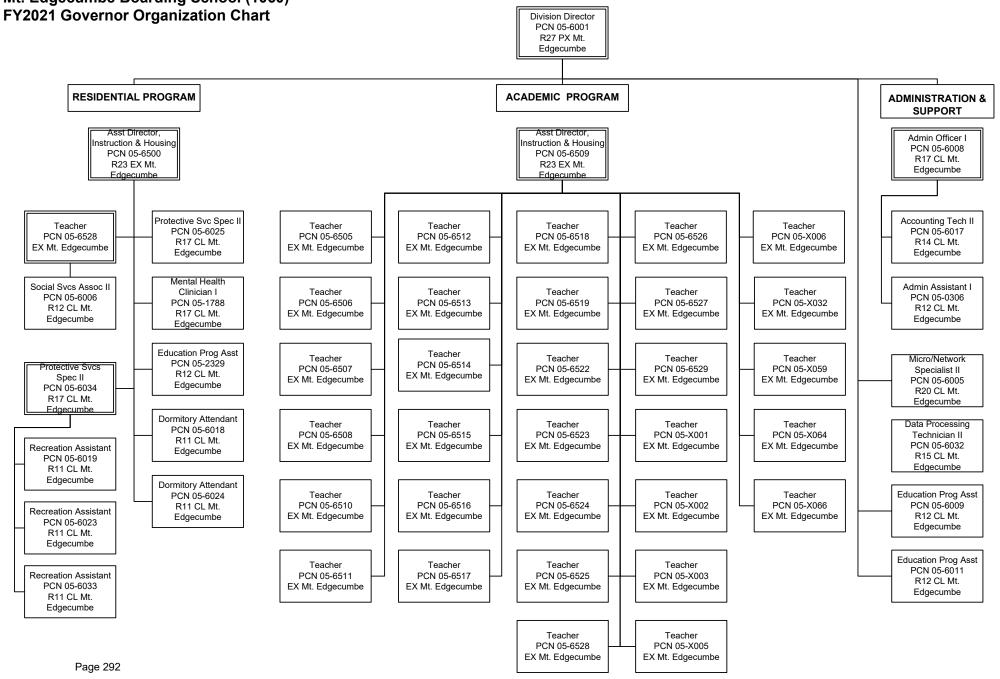

Major RDU Accomplishments in 2019

Libraries

The Historical Collections and Information Services sections implemented ArchivesSpace, which entailed setting up the system, training staff, and transferring brief records for over 1,000 finding aids from Word and PDF files, a project which took hundreds of staff hours. Staff in both Historical Collections and Information Services worked hard to evaluate brochures, websites, indexes, and more for their accessibility issues and current relevance. Some items were simply taken down, but many have been made accessible. Staff continue to work on this project.

The State Library continues to add to its web presence and resources. The State Library participates in the Alaska Library Catalog, which provides patrons with direct access to 3.2 million titles held by 87 Alaska libraries that serve

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92% of the state's population. Through this online catalog, patrons can connect to e-publications on State of Alaska websites. The State Library also uses grant funds to support the mailing costs that member libraries face due to the ease with which patrons can place holds in the Alaska Library Catalog.

While donations to the Historical Collections have slowed slightly since the opening of the Adrew P. Kashevaroff (APK), Libraries has received 40 wonderful collections from films to post cards to posters and more including a certificate from Wien Airlines indicating that the holder had crossed the Arctic Circle and the purchase the Leonard Sugden collection of materials related to The Lure of Alaska, an early documentary film about the Territory. The Friends of the State Libraries, Archives, and Museums (FOSLAM) underwrote this purchase.

The State Library continues to grow public programming in Juneau and attendance continues to climb. Staff consistently need to utilize overflow space in the atrium with a large screen showing the speaker in the lecture hall. This additional space gives those with small children, illnesses, or a sensitivity to crowds the ability to participate in a less crowded setting. Adult programs of note included a reading by U.S. Poet Laureate Tracy K. Smith and an author talk by Leland Hale about his book on the 1982 Craig murders and the Peele case.

Working with the Friends, the Division once again provided a series of hands-on activities for youth, supported in part by grant funding from the City and Borough of Juneau. One event in this series was an afternoon of family friendly activities called Chill with the Family held during January school vacation. This event drew 170 children and 120 adults (double the number of people who attended in 2018) to participate in crafts and activities with an Alaskan theme. As a public service, the State Library, Archives and Museum stayed open for the Alaska Day holiday, with a variety of programs held throughout the building, including an Alaska literary afternoon with four Alaskan authors – the Fowlers, John Straley, Heather Lende, and Ishmael Hope – doing talks on their books and book signings.

Library Development continues to focus on providing content to Alaskans statewide through shared online resources. Thanks to funding from the Department's Early Education section, the State Library extended the statewide subscription for Sesame Street ebooks by 18 months and purchased a statewide two year subscription to TumbleBooks, which includes ebooks, animated ebooks, and videos for kids in kindergarten through 6th grade, in English, Spanish, and French. Tumblebooks is accessible online at http://sled.alaska.edu, as is the Sesame Street ebook service.

The School Broadband Assistance Grant (BAG) program ensures public schools have 10 mbps download speeds. Library Development distributed \$1.3 million in funding to 20 school districts for the 2018-2019 school year. The Online With Libraries (OWL) program helped 24 public libraries with \$108,000 of their internet costs.

Archives

In FY2019, the State Archives accessioned 874 boxes of textual and analogue records, 213 reels of microfilm, and 8.3 TB of electronic records. Accessions of note include a large deposit of 444 volumes and boxes of records from Health Analytics and Vital Records, student records from a defunct private school, materials regarding Russian era Sitka and the first territorial governor Lyman Knapp, personal papers from Governor William Sheffield, and a collection of documents containing signatures from President Washington thru President Kennedy. Over 409 boxes of materials were deaccessioned, leaving an overall increase of 465 cubic feet of records for FY2019.

The State Archives continued working with the Alaska Humanities Forum to increase its educational mission by promoting and providing primary resources for the Alaska History Day and National History Day programs. Staff developed educational web pages targeted to history teachers and students in grades 6-12 and participated in History Day judging events on the Southeast Regional level for the first time, as well as at the state level for the second year. The Archives' focus on education continued to increase as more classes visited the Research Center and staff went to classrooms locally to talk about primary source research.

An exhibit program begun in FY2018 continued with the identification and display of records relevant to milestones in Alaska's history, both in the building and online. Two exhibits of note include World War I and the Alaskan Experience: A Centennial Exhibit and Remembering the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill, commemorating the 30th anniversary of the spill. The State Archives worked with the National World War I Museum and Memorial to install a scrolling list of the one million people who died in this conflict. The State Archives and State Library created a special display on World War I highlighting materials from their collections.

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Staff completed the first ever Collection Development Policy for the State Archives, outlining collections scope and accessioning procedures, access and deaccession procedures, and legal restrictions affecting access and preservation. The Archives continues to work on updating other policies and procedures, with a primary emphasis on updating the Alaska State Electronic Records Archives (ASERA) policies initiated in 2007, as well as working on a division-wide Digital Preservation Policy reflecting the increase in digital objects collected by the Division.

The Department of Education and Early Development purchased ArchivesSocial, a social media archiving software which collects social media feeds and applies retention to them. The software was implemented before the gubernatorial administration change and was able to capture 12 social media sites from the outgoing administration's social media records before transition occurred. Other state agencies have begun using this tool for social media retention and public records access.

Records and Information Management Service (RIMS) continued to concentrate on creating and updating retention schedules, reflecting the increasing presence of electronic records and workflows, both of which have increased within Executive Branch agencies. RIMS staff reviewed software for online delivery of Records Management training, exploring systems that both deliver and record webinars, as well as provide test-based questions to score general knowledge of records management principals. With an increased need for records management training and decreased staff resources, RIMS plans to implement and promote the system in FY2020.

Imaging and Microfilm Service (IMS) continued reformatting services for local government communities, creating disaster recovery microfilm and digitizing thousands of documents, allowing increased access to government records. This unit increased reformatting efforts for Archives holdings as well, allowing access to records digitally.

Museums

Visitor traffic at the Alaska State Museum (ASM) in Juneau and the Sheldon Jackson Museum (SJM) in Sitka was up by over 10,000 visitors during FY2019. This 16.8% increase of visitors was welcome after FY2018 in which visitor counts were flat. Attendance at both museums during the 2019 season was up every month. While walk-in visitors declined after FY2018, there was a 57% increase in the number of tour company admissions. Additionally, youth admissions went up by nearly 25% this year. It appears that the hire of a half-time staff member to facilitate education program visits by local school groups is having its desired effect on educational use of the State Museum. The Sheldon Jackson Museum was fully staffed with three people and was able to be open seven days a week during the summer of 2019.

The temporary exhibit program continues to be successful and popular. The Exhibits Unit installed nine temporary exhibits during FY2019, including a new exhibition at the Governor's office in the Capital. Community feedback has been excellent. Attendance at exhibit openings, events, educational activities and programs has been exceptional. Attendance at First Friday events is regularly reaching 250 visitors.

The State Museum sent two staff members to Anchorage after the November 2018 earthquake. The response team coordinated with 19 museums, cultural and historical centers, performed site visits and surveys, and assisted with mitigation. The Museum's Outreach Curator has submitted a grant application to the NEH for a statewide series of workshops on emergency preparedness for cultural heritage institutions.

Collections staff at ASM and SJM deaccessioned eight sets of human remains and associated funerary objects this year. This was done in close partnership of the US Forest Service and will bring both organizations into closer compliance with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), a federal law that passed in November 1990 to address the rights of Native American and Hawaiian groups and organizations to their cultural items, including human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects and objects of cultural patrimony. Repatriation under NAGPRA began in the 1990s, but Alaska museums have often struggled with this process due to the complex nature of land ownership in the state. In recent years, federal agencies and Alaska's museums have worked hard to overcome these barriers.

Online With Libraries (OWL)

The Online With Libraries (OWL) Program, managed by the Library Development unit, continues to assist public library patrons with enhanced internet access and a statewide videoconference network. Public libraries across Alaska can afford modest broadband internet by merging State OWL funds with Federal E-Rate subsidies and local library funds. The OWL network provides videoconference capabilities via public libraries to a wide array of

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government, educational, and nonprofit organizations, who benefit from this cost-effective method of communicating with and training Alaskans in rural communities.

In FY2019, the OWL videoconference network held 271 videoconferences for over 1,127 hours of videoconference time. Alaskans were able to stay in their home towns for government hearings, university classes, job interviews and more. OWL internet subsidy funding helped 24 public libraries afford internet speeds robust enough for operation of the videoconference network.

Live Homework Help

In FY2019, Live Homework Help provided 3,681 hours of tutoring assistance to 10,021 Alaskan students. Each session lasted an average of 22 minutes. Student appreciation for this service remains strong, with 98% of students reporting they would recommend this service to a friend.

Facility Management

The Sheldon Jackson Museum (SJM) and the Stratton Library (Stratton) in Sitka are included in the APK Facilities Maintenance component.

The Division has implemented a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, Division of Facility Services (DFS) starting in July 2018. DFS staff assumed responsibility for routine maintenance for the first time since the APK building was constructed in 2016 and for the first time since the State purchased the SJM in 1984, and Stratton Library in 2010. Funding for the SLA comes from the APK facility management budget and through Division program receipts for the Sitka facilities.

The Division of Facility Services (DFS) filled a vacant maintenance specialist position, which was assigned to the APK in April 2019. DFS staff in Sitka are performing maintenance at the Sheldon Jackson Museum and Stratton facilities. The DFS maintenance employees have lifted a great burden off the Division, reduced the use of outside contractors for standard repairs, and substantially improved response time to maintenance needs.

The APK well water cooling system failed in 2017. Following the Request for Proposals and construction phases, this failed cooling system was replaced with a convention glycol chiller, which began operation in April 2019. Capital funding from construction of the APK covered the \$2,200,000 design and installation expenses.

Key RDU Challenges

Libraries

Since both Information Services and the Historical Collections obtain materials in a wide variety of formats, the Division faces a number of challenges in preserving and providing access to these items. For newer formats, staff continue to work on developing better systems for finding, accessing, and preserving electronic resources. A draft Digital Preservation policy has been completed and staff are working to develop a shared digital preservation plan. The State Library and Archives are implementing a year-long trial of Preservica, which may serve as an ongoing platform for preservation and possibly for ingest and access of digital records.

The State Publications program staff have been deeply involved with the Statewide Data Hub project, which has taken a great deal of time. The Hub project will help the Library fulfill its statutory requirements with regard to data created or compiled by State agencies. Staff have also spent time on the creation of an institutional repository for digital materials, on crawling and preserving webpages, and on developing a more sustainable storage solution for digital materials. The ongoing, growing, and staggering cost of digital data storage remains an unsolved challenge.

The Division has reached a crisis stage with some audiovisual (AV) material that cannot currently be accessed due to the lack of working equipment, a problem that will expand over time as more AV equipment becomes unavailable or irreparable. The solution is to migrate to newer formats promptly, but migration and digital storage in the newer formats is time-consuming and expensive. Similarly, some audiovisual material in magnetic formats are past their anticipated shelf life. These materials need to be migrated, but due to budget, staff, and time constraints, the Division will likely lose some irreplaceable Alaskana audio and video.

Archives

The Alaska State Archives and the Records and Information Management Services (RIMS) policies, procedures, and

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funding regarding electronic records and email retention are an ongoing effort. The Alaska State Electronic Records Archives (ASERA), established in 2007, continues to be an unfunded program for Alaska's increasing electronic records preservation needs. Archives staff have reviewed cloud-hosted software systems to help address electronic records issues, but funding remains unobtainable. The State Archives currently holds over 45 TB of digital records, representing over 3,680,000 digital objects. Current rates of ingest are estimated at 4-5 TB per annum. The amounts of born digital content statewide are unknown, but Archives receives more of these records every year. Currently, electronic records are housed on Net Apps and RAID servers, but the important pieces of software, staffing and sustainability have not been adequately addressed.

Upon moving into the APK building, the vault space allocated for archival records growth was limited. Through deaccession and reformatting efforts, current ingest rates of paper and microfilm records are being maintained, leaving 4-5 years of growth space left for the State Archives. Staff began reappraising and deaccessioning records in FY2019, reformatting paper records to digital and microfilm formats, but funding for these activities and data storage is becoming less available and these activities may need to cease next fiscal year.

Initial tests of microfilm holdings in FY2016 indicated the presence of acetate film base degradation, commonly known as "vinegar syndrome." Full scale testing of the microfilm holdings begun in FY2018 indicates degradation is occurring. Archives has continued testing the microfilm in FY2019, but has decreased this activity due to staffing issues. Also, funding sources to copy the acetate based microfilm over to polyester base has not been identified, but other preservation steps, such as segregating the film and freezing it and assessing the material for continued historical permanence and access, have been implemented.

Archives and RIMS staff worked to make all on-line documents and records ADA compliant during FY2019 per a directive from Department of Education and Early Development. Due to the nature of some materials needing transcription, particularly those items that were hand-written in cursive, documents were removed from the Archives' website in order to meet the directive. Due to lack of staff to transcribe documents, the Archives can no longer digitize and provide web access to records as a means of dissemination to students and researchers for the vast majority of the collections until further funding is procured to provide transcription services to meet ADA requirements.

Museums

The State's aviation collection, which is currently on loan at the Aviation Heritage Museum in Anchorage, is challenging. The Museum would like to bring some of these objects to Juneau before they sustain further damage, but do not have the space required to store them. Museums increasingly relies on gate receipts to perform these statutorily mandated programs.

Staff retention in the Visitor Services Unit at the Alaska State Museum in Juneau continued to be a resource drain over the course of the year. The Museum Assistant, seasonal Museum Assistant, and On-call Museum Assistant positions, which service the front desks at the Alaska State Museum, all turned over during FY2019, necessitating much time in the hiring to fill the positions. These positions are full-time, on-call, seasonal jobs at a low pay range, so they turn over frequently.

Museums has seen walk-in admission revenue drop for two consecutive years. While these weak numbers have been offset by increased tour bus admissions, we need to turn that trend around. The Museum does not have a budget for advertising and marketing, so we continue to strengthen relationships with partners. The City and Borough of Juneau is working on a wayfinding project that will improve visitors' ability to navigate the downtown core. Revitalization of Centennial Hall and the Juneau Arts and Humanities Center will bring more foot traffic to the Auk Village District and should improve the Museum's walk-in numbers.

Online With Libraries (OWL)

Public libraries are often the only place in rural Alaska with free internet. The OWL Program's affordable internet network remains vital in giving online access to education, e-government, e-commerce, and other business needs to rural residents, while saving travel costs.

Live Homework Help

Each tutoring session now costs \$7.75 regardless of length. The Division cannot persuade the vendor to offer a flat annual cost for the service regardless of usage. The challenge facing the Division is balancing the need to pay to advertise this service to increase usage, while also ensuring we have enough funding to pay the cost for sessions that

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grow in number as Live Homework Help is advertised.

Facility Management

The Division relies on the Division of Facility Services for maintenance, to develop a facility condition index, and to conduct a facility audit to prioritize deferred maintenance. This information and these tools will benefit all departments, but the audit has not occurred and prioritization of deferred maintenance is somewhat random. In addition, Facility Services' comprehensive maintenance management system (CMMS) is not yet ready for the input of preventative maintenance information, which will inform the work on maintenance at Division buildings. The Division Operations Manager will be responsible for providing accurate preventative maintenance information for the database.

Security patrols at the APK are at the bare minimum. The Division contracts for one guard to work during public hours, perform two random night patrols, and cover any additional hours during after-hour events. During FY2019, an exterior glass artwork was vandalized; the quote provided by the artist to repair it is \$28,900. The defendant was charged in the crime, but is indigent and can make no restitution. Risk Management is determining whether it will cover the cost of repair; if they do so, the Division will still need to pay the \$10,000 deductible. Vandalism has fortunately been minor, averaging less than \$1,000 per year.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Staff will continue to develop public programs across units, with each section contributing to large events and coordinating their efforts, such as the exhibits and programs that will be developed in conjunction with the exhibit of Alaska Native regalia, the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage and the 19th Amendment, and the 50th anniversary of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act in 2021.

Although there was a slight shift in direction and focus due to a year-long trial subscription to Preservica, the State Library will fully implement a digital repository for born electronic documents from State agencies, focusing on preservation and access. Staff are exploring the possibility of joining with the University of Alaska to use their ScholarWorks system to provide more user friendly ingest and access to born-electronic State publications.

While completion has been delayed due to the unanticipated quantity of work required by the accessibility and Data Hub projects, both Information Services and Historical Collections have made progress in streamlining processes and developing updated official policies. This work will continue in FY2021, with the completion of an overhaul of the Library's Collection Development policy and the donation and accession policy.

Archives staff will increase education opportunities for K-12 students, concentrating on delivering primary sources on-line for increased reference access, as well as recording webinars for records management training to meet on-demand needs of State government employees.

Visitor numbers at the Alaska State Museum in Juneau should continue to increase through FY2021 based on a small projected increase in the expected number of cruise ship visitors and by the continued revitalization of educational programs. Additionally we should see an increase in the number of people who see our traveling exhibitions, as there are several traveling exhibits in development for the 2021-2022 timeframe.

During FY2021, the OWL program will continue to focus on increasing the bandwidth in those public libraries receiving OWL grant awards. Additional libraries with low bandwidth will again be solicited to join the OWL grant program. The annual survey of Alaska's public libraries reveal that most OWL subsidized libraries have significantly less bandwidth than is required to support their workstations at the level for "General Browsing and Email" recommended by the FCC (1 mbps per workstation).

Department of Education and Early Development Library Operations Component Budget Summary

Component: Library Operations

Contribution to Department's Mission

To provide access to information, to train school and public librarians, and to preserve the history of the state.

Core Services

- HISTORICAL COLLECTIONS: Provides reference and research services on Alaskana subjects. It collects,
 organizes, preserves and provides access to Alaskan materials including private papers and materials important
 to the state's culture and history. Historical Collections serves as the primary historical research collection for
 state government and the legislature, as well as providing state, national, and international researchers with
 historical information on Alaska.
- INFORMATION SERVICES: Concentrates on access to up-to-date information for state agencies and the
 legislature by providing periodicals, reports, state and federal documents, and other materials in a variety of
 formats. Municipal governments, the private sector, Native organizations, schools and the general public also rely
 on these services. Operates the State Documents Depository, collecting and distributing materials published by
 state agencies, regardless of format.
- LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT: Libraries are a major constituency of this unit. Staff provides assistance and
 information to all libraries and library staff regarding library management, operations and technology, E-Rate, the
 OWL program, early childhood literacy, grants available from the State Library, library statistics, federal programs,
 and continuing education statewide. Also coordinates the books by mail service for Alaskans and partners with
 the Alaska Library Network on the statewide databases.
- TALKING BOOKS CENTER: The service was successfully outsourced to the Utah State Library in FY2016. The
 Alaska State Library receives and reviews patron applications, then transfers the applications to Utah for service,
 and publicizes the program statewide. The Division pays Utah a per-patron fee for these specialized services.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

Historical Collections and Information Services

One new type of program this year has been the Collections Spotlight, where exhibits of Historical Collections materials on a specific topic are created in the Research Center. The exhibit links to a talk, current event, or museum exhibit. In June, more than 80 people viewed a display of salmon can labels, cannery maps, fish trap blueprints, stereographs, photographs, and scrapbooks, and ran a historic film of cannery workings on the TV. This display accompanied an author talk in the lecture hall on Tin Can Country: Southeast Alaska's Historic Salmon Canneries.

Many Alaska government publications are preserved electronically on Division servers and can be found by searching the Alaska Library Catalog. Staff are investigating the use of Preservica to preserve electronic publications and using ScholarWorks as a system for improved ingest of and access to these materials. One benefit to ScholarWorks is that state agency staff would be able to upload their own electronic publications to the system.

One important resource that we were unable to make accessible using automated processes was the Juneau Vital Statistics Index, a compilation of birth, death, and marriage information from area newspapers printed in dot matrix format. The only way to replicate this data was by re-keying, so staff decided to turn to the community for help with volunteer work parties. Volunteers have donated 20 hours on this project so far and have had a good time doing so.

Several people in Information Services and the State Archives have been involved with the Statewide Data Hub project. In addition to extensive work, often through committees and groups, on research and planning, the Alaska State Library also applied for and won a Civic Switchboard grant. These grants focus on making data more findable and usable for civic groups and agencies. In our case, it was used to gather information through a statewide survey, to hold an Innovation Summit in Juneau and online for about 40 State agency staff and Alaskan data users and providers, and to compile and synthesize the results and their implications for this project.

Library Development

Library Development staff distributed \$3.2 million in grants to libraries and schools statewide:

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Released December 23, 2019

Department of Education and Early Development

- Eighty schools received \$1.3 million in School BAG awards.
- Public library assistance grants of \$7,000 each provided operating funding support to 102 libraries and one bookmobile.
- Six large statewide grants totaling \$887,000 provided audiobooks to blind Alaskans, purchased statewide online resources on SLED, provided library services by mail and phone to rural Alaskans, and provided board books and early literacy in tubs and kits to day care centers, libraries, and caregivers statewide.
- The OWL program awarded \$108,000 to 24 libraries to assist with internet expenses.
- Seventy library staff received continuing education reimbursement grants totaling \$89,000.
- The remaining funds covered a broad range of smaller project grants to libraries.

Library Development provides a broad selection of basic training and continuing education opportunities to library staff in Alaska. Twenty school librarians attended a week-long leadership academy in July 2018. The Small Library Institute for Continuing Education brought 20 public librarians together for mid-level training. Twenty-five librarians attended online training sessions funded by the State Library through the InfoPeople training service. The directors from the 20 largest public libraries met for leadership and futuring training.

STEM programming remains a high priority in libraries nationwide, so Library Development applied for a grant to implement the NASA@ My Library project. Staff provided training on the kits and have been checking out three Science, Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) kits to libraries wishing to use these kits in public programs. The Library Technology consultant investigated virtual reality hardware and software, purchased a system, and has trained librarians, superintendents, and teachers individually and at conferences on this emerging technology. He even sent the DEED Commissioner to the moon using one VR program.

The State Library funds an E-Rate consultant to work with every school district and with public libraries on the E-Rate application process. As a result, Alaska's schools and libraries benefit from millions of dollars in telecommunications subsidies annually; in FY2018, E-Rate awarded more than \$148 million to Alaska's schools and libraries. The consultant provides assistance to schools and libraries that participate in this complex program and represents Alaska's interests in national broadband and E-Rate discussions.

Schools Broadband Assistance Grant (School BAG)

The 2018 Alaska State Legislature once again appropriated funds to assist to schools that had internet speeds of less than 10 mbps; these funds supplement federal E-rate funds and local school district funds used to pay for internet. The funds were distributed to school districts, reimbursing eligible costs incurred by the district in FY2019. Twenty school districts applied for and received \$1.3 million in state financial assistance to bring bandwidth at 80 rural schools up to 10 Mbps. Library Development staff supplied School BAG data and input to the 2019 Legislature as it passed a School BAG at 25 mbps bill through the Senate and began consideration of it in the House.

Key Component Challenges

Demand for services is increasing. Service delivery is shifting from walk-in patrons to online support, with increasing demand to have information and images available on the internet. The shift from physical access to virtual access for Alaskana materials means that Division staff have to segment their handling of these materials and must re-tool traditional processes and obtain staff training to meet the new demands of the virtual world.

As discussed in more detail above, primary source materials in sometimes obsolete formats continue the natural process of aging and deterioration. Special environmental controls and preservation techniques extend the lives of these documents. Digitizing many will lead to less handling as well as broader availability. In some cases, such as electronic or magnetic media, this is the only option for preservation and ongoing access. The State Library continues to contribute to Alaska's Digital Archives.

One great technology challenge is perpetual access to electronic documents. Hard copy formats, such as paper or microfilm, may have a better prospect for long-term survival. The State Library continues to explore additional options for preservation of and easy access to resources created by the State of Alaska. It has been difficult to preserve electronic and magnetic media before it becomes permanently inaccessible.

School broadband demands grow at a fast rate, so the current 10 mbps support schools receive with School BAG is not sufficient after six years of funding. Many schools are choosing to exit the School BAG program, which has

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become a deterrent to increasing broadband due to the limit of 10 mbps in Alaska statute. In FY2015, schools received \$3.7 million in School BAG support; in FY2019, this amount had decreased to \$1.3 million. If legislation increasing School BAG to 25 mbps passes the House in 2020, this would lead to a significant increase in the number of schools eligible for this funding and will impact the State Library staff who manage the School BAG program.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

During FY2020, the Division will pilot the Preservica system to determine whether it meets the Division's digital preservation requirements. Archives is confident that Preservica will meet their needs, but the Library is not sure whether Preservica will meet their institutional repository system needs by streamlining the ingest of, access to, and preservation of electronic materials from State agencies. If the Library signs off on Preservica for FY2021, staff will expand its use to more State agencies, to digitized newspapers beyond those included in the National Digital Newspaper Project, to key federal documents related to Alaska, or to other Alaskana. If Preservica does meet Library needs, staff may also implement a separate ingest system with better public access functionality, such as the University of Alaska's ScholarWorks.

During 2019, the Senate passed a School BAG at 25 mbps bill. If this enhanced School BAG legislation passes the House in FY2020, staff will re-tool grant documents and monitor the impact of additional grant applications in terms of staffing level and the additional time it will take the E-Rate consultant to review the School BAG application packets.

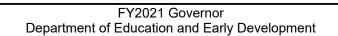

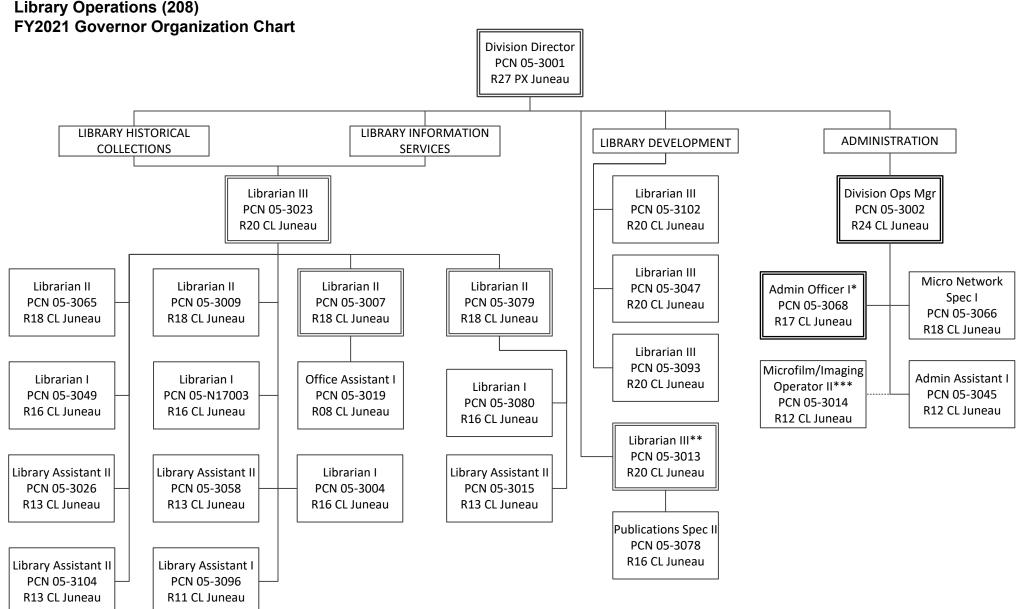

Component: Archives

Contribution to Department's Mission

To provide access to information, to preserve the history of the state, and to provide training for archivists and records managers.

Core Services

- ARCHIVES: Identifies, preserves and makes available state and territorial government records of permanent value. After appraising, accessioning, arranging and describing the material, staff provide reference and research services to state and local government personnel, historians, researchers, and the general public.
- RECORDS MANAGEMENT PROGRAM: Concentrates on the systematic creation, organization, maintenance and disposition of records. This section assists state agencies in files management, records retention scheduling and disposition; in determining the administrative, fiscal, legal, and historical values of records; in determining how long the records should be retained; and ensuring the periodic legal disposal of records.
- IMAGING AND MICROFILM SERVICE (IMS): Provides microfilm and digitizing services for state and local
 government agencies. The service provides a cost-effective option for maintenance and storage of records legally
 suited for preservation media. IMS continues to film Alaska newspapers and distribute to other repository
 libraries.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

The State Archives supported State and local government, businesses, and the public by preserving approximately 27,000 cubic feet of historic and legally significant records and providing research services. The State Archives provided leadership and consultation to State and local governments in records management, including updating records retention schedules and helping important State records come into the possession of the State Archives. Major projects included a partnership with the Department of Fish and Game to digitize and make accessible audio tapes regarding important fisheries information and document policymaking decisions by the Boards of Fish and Game and Department of Law to process the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill litigation records from the Civil Division.

Multiple K-12 school field trips occurred during FY2019, with students visiting, viewing materials, and learning about Alaska from teaching sessions offered by archivists. The Archives partnered with the Alaska Humanities Forum to judge and host Alaska History Day projects for grades 6-12 and promote primary source history education.

The Archives' online digitized resources increased to 98,809 digital objects searchable on partner sites at Familysearch.org, Ancestry.com, and the Alaska Digital Archives. Over 874 cubic feet of textual records and 8.3 terabytes (TB) of born digital records were accessioned in FY2019, spanning district, territorial and statehood periods, from 1867 to 2019, while 409 cubic feet of textual records and microforms were deaccessioned, with an overall increase of 465 cubic feet of materials.

Records and Information Management Service (RIMS) concentrated on updating retention schedules to reflect the increasing presence of electronic records and workflows, both of which have increased within Executive Branch agencies. Education and consultations with State Agency staff regarding electronic records needs were the pressing priorities of the unit.

Imaging and Microfilm Service (IMS) increased reformatting services to local government communities, creating disaster recovery microfilm, and digitizing thousands of records, allowing increased access to government records. This unit increased reformatting efforts for Archives holdings as well, to alleviate space issues encountered through increased accessions of textual records.

Key Component Challenges

Electronic records are created in a variety of formats generated with hardware and software that quickly becomes obsolete. State officials need assistance and guidance from the State Archives and RIMS for managing the legal and administrative requirements associated with current paper/electronic records systems and preparing the transfer of permanent electronic records to the State Archives. State Archives will need to maintain hardware and software to manage the digital collections held or coming into the State Archives, plus continuing education in order to address challenges within the evolving field of digital records management.

The State Archives houses over 45 TB of digital holdings, amounting to 3,680,519 digital objects. The Archives does not have software to service these holdings and must partner with other entities to do so. Of these digital records, 76,408 are indexed vital records available for public research via Family Search.org; 17,711 are probate records available for research on Ancestry.com; and 1,105 digitized records are available on Alaska's Digital Archives. This represents only 3% of the digital records the State Archives holds; the remaining 97% of digital records held by the Archives are not available via the web and cannot be analyzed to document public access.

The State Archives has received the last records from Department of Law for the Exxon Valdes Oil Spill litigation. Over 1,400 boxes of materials from Department of Law are held in the collections, but not open to the public due to confidentiality requirements. Additional funding is being supplied by Department of Law to allow Archives staff to work with Law to identify records that are open to the public, reformat them for access, and allow for microfilming of the materials to meet space reduction needs in the Archives.

Continued degradation of microforms from vinegar syndrome challenges both short-term administration and long-term preservation of assets. Actions are underway to better document the scale of vinegar syndrome in the collection; the expense of replacing deteriorated microforms is expected to be high.

RIMS continues to look for and remediate data deficiencies at contracted records centers, with the goal of decreasing State storage fees at both records centers in Anchorage and Juneau.

Archives continued to work with the Office of Information Technology (OIT) regarding migrating email from Enterprise Vault to Office 365. The challenge of legal discovery, permanent retention storage, and long-term email policies has continued through FY2019.

Imaging and Microfilm Service (IMS) traditional microfilm services have decreased, but digitization services have increased. IMS staff have expanded their services beyond Executive branch agencies. Preservation and access imaging and disaster recovery microfilm services have been expanded to local government agencies.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Archives staff will increase education opportunities for K-12 students, concentrating on programs about primary sources on-line for increased reference access, as well as record webinars for records management training to meet on-demand needs of state government employees.

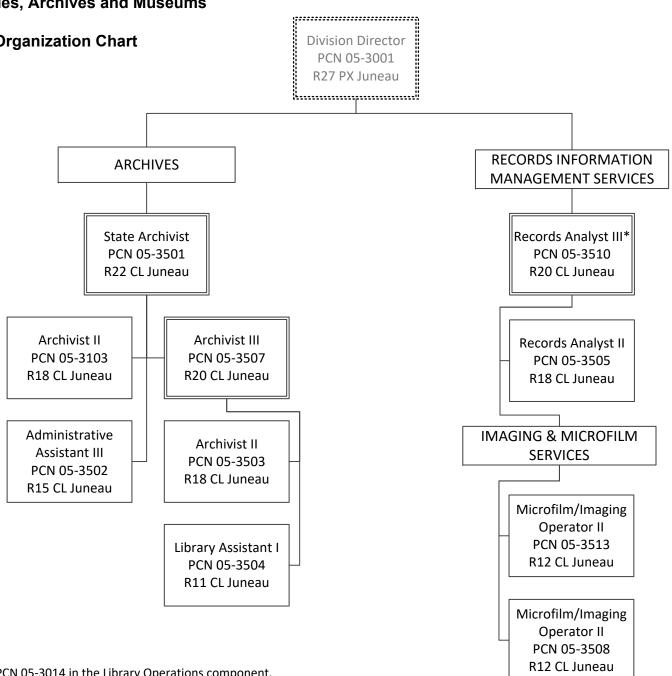

Component Budget Summary

Component: Museum Operations

Contribution to Department's Mission

To provide access to information, to preserve the history of the state, and to promote the development of museums statewide.

Core Services

- COLLECTIONS: The museums' collections are an important and visible means of preserving Alaska's history. Their acquisition, documentation, preservation, and security are fundamental to securing Alaska's history and culture for future Alaskans. Products developed include temporary and traveling exhibits, public displays around the state, films, books, educational materials, technical papers, newsletters, guides, and other publications.
- EDUCATION: Museum educational programs encourage and guide increased interaction between local museums and schools. The museums aim to increase the utilization of the State Museums by school-age children, students, teachers, and the community and to improve the linkages between the schools and museum community. This usage of the museums increases knowledge and understanding of Alaska's rich, unique, and important history.
- MUSEUM DEVELOPMENT: The direct support of other Alaska museums is accomplished through the provision
 of: 1) professional consulting services in artifact preservation, collection management, educational programming,
 exhibit design and museum management, 2) direct financial support through a competitive Grant-in-Aid program,
 and, 3) a museum services program that provides resource material and referral services directly to other
 museums in Alaska.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

Through additional resources and changes to staff scheduling, the Sheldon Jackson Museum was able to open to the public seven days a week during the summer of 2019. This had the simultaneous benefit of increasing gate receipt revenue, which helps us pay for staff salary and upkeep of the building, while at the same time responding to feedback from our customers in the Sitka tourism industry.

The temporary exhibit program continues to be successful and popular. The Exhibits Unit installed 9 temporary exhibits during FY2019, including a new exhibition at the Governor's office in the capital building. Community feedback has been excellent. Attendance at exhibit opening, events, educational activities and programs has been exceptional. Attendance at First Friday events is regularly reaching 250 visitors.

The FY2019 Grant-in-Aid Program provided \$105,600 in funding to 13 museums in 9 House districts and 8 Senate districts. Grants supported were primarily collections management based this year. The Grant-in-Aid is one of just three grant opportunities specifically intended to support Alaska museums. It serves as the primary source of State funding for many local museums and tribal cultural centers.

Key Component Challenges

Collections staff have been challenged by a lack of funding available for collections management projects that are becoming overdue. Management of the State's aviation collection which is currently on loan at the Aviation Heritage Museum in Anchorage is reaching a crisis stage. We would like to bring some of these objects to Juneau before they sustain further damage, but do not have the funding required to make that happen. Funding for the Exhibition Program continues to be a shoestring ordeal. We have managed to pay for all of our exhibits so far but we have some major projects coming up and there is no general fund monies to pay for these expenses. We continue to use gate receipts and raise money to perform these basic statutorily mandated programs.

Staff retention in the Visitor Services unit at the Alaska State Museum in Juneau continued to be a resource drain over the course of the year. These positions are full time, on-call, seasonal, and at a low pay range, so they turn over at a high rate.

We have seen walk-in admission revenue drop for two consecutive years. Those weak seasons have been offset by improving tour bus admissions, however, we need to turn that trend around. The Division does not have a budget for advertising and marketing, so we will continue to strengthen relationships with partners. The City and Borough of Juneau should complete a wayfinding project that will improve visitor's ability to navigate the downtown core. This project was delayed by a lawsuit about use of cruise ship tax revenue in the Borough. Additionally, revitalization of Centennial Hall and the Juneau Arts and Humanities Center will bring more foot traffic to the Auk Village District and improve our walk-in numbers. Location of a cruise ship berth on the old Mental Health Trust land at the Subport would be seen as an advantage to the Museum.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Visitor numbers at the Alaska State Museum in Juneau should continue to increase through FY2021 based on a small projected increase in the expected number of cruise ship visitors and by the continued revitalization of educational programs. We should also see in increase in the number of people who see our traveling exhibitions as there are several traveling exhibits in development for 2021-2022.

Component: Online with Libraries (OWL)

Contribution to Department's Mission

OWL builds capacity for Alaska's public libraries together with E-rate and local contribution by funding basic broadband internet and supplying videoconferencing capability, training and content for Alaskans. Students who need access to computers after school hours have enhanced access at their public libraries.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

In FY2019, the OWL internet subsidy helped 24 public libraries across the state. OWL continues to offer crucial assistance to Alaskan libraries by enhancing internet capacity for library patrons. Many of the public libraries offer the only public internet in their towns, a criteria which will prove to be especially crucial as the 2020 Census goes to online reporting next year.

Key Component Challenges

The key challenge facing OWL is the aging of the videoconference network infrastructure as well as reduced use of the videoconferencing network. During FY2017 and FY2018 OWL staff engaged in frequent training and outreach to encourage usage, however, by FY2019 usage declined approximately 40% since FY2016. This resulted in a videoconference operating cost of approximately \$860 per conference, making it an expensive component of the OWL program to maintain.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

Due to the aging videoconference network infrastructure and its reduced usage, the videoconferencing component of OWL is slated to be eliminated FY2021. Grants to assist libraries with paying for internet services will still continue.

Teachers work eight hours a day for 180 days a year, a total of 1,440 hours. During FY2019, Live Homework Help provided tutoring hours equal to the number of hours for 2.6 full-time teachers at a cost to the State of \$138,200.

Key Component Challenges

Live Homework Help is a popular service that regularly elicits high levels of satisfaction and wonderful comments from the students who have engaged with the tutors. This service clearly supports the overall mission of the Department of Education and Early Development; however, the flat funding level means that the State Library cannot engage in active advertising without draining funds from other State Library services. The vendor charges a flat-fee for each tutoring session, so increased advertising leads to increased session costs. It is a balancing act for the Division to determine how much advertising and increased student uptake we can afford.

Contribution to Department's Mission

FACILITY MANAGEMENT: Budgets, coordinates, and manages the operations, maintenance, repair, renewal, and replacement of the state-owned Father Andrew P. Kashevaroff (APK) Building in Juneau, Alaska. Staff in this section also coordinate and manage the operations, maintenance and repair of the state-owned the Sheldon Jackson Museum and Stratton Building in Sitka, Alaska.

Core Services

 Alaska Libraries, Museums, Archives and the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, Division of Facility Services staff provide for the repair, replacement, upgrade, and utilities for the operations and maintenance of the APK Building and two facilities in Sitka, Alaska.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

The lecture hall, atrium and classroom at the APK were rented 99 times with an attendance of 2,709 people at these events. Rentals provided over \$30.0 in income to the Division. The Twilight Café and the store added another \$5.0 to Division receipts.

A monument street sign for the APK building was designed and awarded to a fabricator to help visitors find this building in response to complaints frequently heard by Division staff. The sign will be installed during FY2020.

A deferred maintenance request to replace the cedar shake roof on the Sheldon Jackson Museum was approved by OMB in early FY2020. Since the Museum is on the National Historical Register, the new roof must meet the standards expected of such significant structures.

The Division gained clarity on the future of the Stratton facility in Sitka. During FY2018, the Division finished spending an FY2012 capital award to renovate that facility so that the top floor could be used for storage for the Museum next door and so that the lower flower could be rented out. That award was not enough to make the Stratton habitable, so it sat empty and incomplete once renovation ended early in FY2019. Governor Dunleavy's FY2020 budget from February 2019 included a directive to sell the Stratton. Another capital award of \$900,000 was vetoed by the Governor in the final FY2020 budget. Staff are moving forward with plans to sell the Stratton during FY2020.

Other accomplishments during FY2019 include:

- Installation of clean agent fire suppression in the APK server room;
- The Division Operations Manager provided a list of assets at the APK and Sitka facilities to DFS for their comprehensive maintenance management system, which tracks inventory of system and equipment assets, schedules preventative maintenance, and tracks maintenance requests;
- Corrective action to rewire the emergency lighting in the Museum galleries and in the mechanical/electrical room:
- Tracking down and correcting domestic water pressure fluctuation issues that were leading to expensive humidifier and fixture repairs and replacement;
- Removal of expensive carbon filtration from air handling units for public areas;
- Purchase of new 2-way radios for security and purchase of folding tables and café tables for lecture hall, atrium and classroom use; and
- New computer and upgraded software purchased for the network lighting system.

Completion of operating policies on parking, food and beverage, and ADA accommodations and a general code of conduct for the APK.

Key Component Challenges

The expense of operating the new chiller, which started up in April 2019, is proving to be astronomical. Division staff had estimated that we would need an additional \$36,000 for FY2020 electricity for the chiller in both the supplemental and amended budget requests; instead APK electric utility costs are expected to increase by an additional \$149,500 for FY2020. On the bright side, LAM overpaid the Division of Facility Services during FY2019 for maintenance of the APK, SJM, and Stratton. These funds have been carried forward into FY2020. This overpayment has reduced the FY2020 shortage in the APK facility budget by \$95,000. Once the electricity costs are included, the APK facility budget alone is short \$39,000 for FY2020.

The Division has never received funding to operate or maintain the Sheldon Jackson Museum. We requested funds to operate and maintain the Sheldon Jackson Museum in both the FY2020 supplemental and FY2021 amended budget requests, but these requests were denied. The Division continues to rely on program receipts and Library operating funds to help maintain this facility.

In September 2019, the Division requested an additional \$333.1 for operating Division facilities in the FY2021 budget. As of October 30, the Division needs an additional \$326.0 in the FY2021 Budget. These funds would cover:

•	Total	\$326,000
•	Contingency increase of 2%	\$25,600
•	Service level O&M contract with DFS	\$95,000
•	Storage costs for SJM following sale of the Stratton	\$20,000
•	Sheldon Jackson Museum operating costs	\$89,900
•	Increased electricity costs for the APK	\$39,000
•	Renewal of one service contracts for building automation	\$46,500

The State purchased the Stratton Library in 2010 for \$2.5 million. In FY2012, the Division was awarded \$900,000 in capital to use on upgrades. The plan was to use the top floor of the Stratton for Museum storage and to rent out the bottom floor for enough rent to operate and maintain the building. In FY2018, the capital funding was exhausted, yet upgrades were still needed in order to make the facility suitable to rent. The Division accepted the suggestion of selling the Stratton in FY2019, so it was added to the Governor's property disposal list.

The Division plans to sell the building during FY2020. Problems with accomplishing this goal include the fact that the Department has no statutory authority under which it can sell properties. In addition, Division staff will need to rent space in Sitka to house Museum supplies, the hands-on collection, and a variety of large Museum objects, including a whale skull and jawbone. While there are non-profits in interested in acquiring the Stratton, it is questionable whether they would be able to afford the appraised value of the property.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

If the Stratton is sold during FY2020, the Division has petitioned that the proceeds of that sale be used as capital to purchase property directly behind the Sheldon Jackson Museum during FY2021. This will allow the Division to expand the annex portion of the Museum. This additional space in the SJM will provide for the expansion of collections and supply storage and the upgrade of the HVAC system.

The Division anticipates working with the Department of Transportation on a much-needed energy performance audit of the APK. In consultation with the building's design team, the Department and the Division believe that an independent auditor, in consultation with the mechanical design engineers, will find operating efficiencies and cost effective alternatives that will lead to reduced utility costs in FY2021.

The Division continues to work through the slowly disappearing list of APK facility projects using the remaining capital funds on account with the Department of Transportation. Spend out of these capital funds is anticipated during FY2021 on the following needs:

- Auto-operator installation on the Museum gallery entry doors to address life safety and American with Disability Act (ADA) access concerns. Design is 90% complete; expected completion January 2021.
- Install glass to the clerestory ceiling between the library and atrium and add transfer ventilation to address noise and correct air return issues (Design 90% complete by February 2020; completion by May 2021.
- Clerestory window blinds for south and east facing windows over the library and research center. Design 90% complete; completion by August 2021.
- Davit arm roof crane to lift filters and equipment to maintain the five dedicated outside air units located on the

roof. Design recommendations complete February 2020; completion September 2020.

During FY2020, OMB approved our deferred maintenance request to replace the cedar shake roof on the Sheldon Jackson Museum at a cost of \$400,000, a project which will be started this fiscal year. Other FY2020 pending capital budget requests for the Sheldon Jackson Museum include expansion of the annex, HVAC replacement, and window replacement.

Contribution to Department's Mission

Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education's (ACPE) mission is to promote access to and success in education and career training beyond high school.

Core Services

- Provide Alaska students with low-cost supplemental education loans.
- Increase public awareness and use of ACPE's services as Alaska's higher education assistance agency.
- Efficiently deliver state financial aid programs, information, and materials to Alaska students and parents.
- Ensure Alaska's authorized institutions operate within academic, administrative and financial standards.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Priorities for ACPE relate to promoting access to and success in education and career training beyond high school and include education planning tools and resources, advocacy and support for postsecondary participation in Alaska, and financial aid for college and career training;
- Published the second annual <u>Alaska Higher Education Almanac</u> as a resource to empower policy makers and stakeholders and a companion presentation on higher education in Alaska;
- Completed the third year of the Alaska Education Loan Refinancing Program (Refi) as a permanent loan
 program, offering Alaska residents the opportunity to refinance all their education loan debt, regardless of
 lender, at reduced cost, with the long-term goal of achieving servicing savings sufficient to reduce costs for
 new student borrowers;
- Offered Alaska students access to a very low-cost supplemental education loan, with a fixed interest rate as low as 4.93% APR and no origination fee;
- Reduced borrower costs by offering interest rate reductions on the 2019 Alaska Supplemental Education Loan for borrowers attending school in Alaska and borrowers enrolling in automated payments;
- Originated \$9.4 million in loans to 897 in-school borrowers;
- Refinanced \$8.1 million in education loans for 169 borrowers; of that amount \$4.9 million are external loans brought to Alaska for servicing;
- Serviced a \$214 million education loan portfolio;
- Supported online education loan accounts for over 30,000 borrowers;
- Enabled 1,237 Alaska students and their families to save ~\$12 million (an average savings of over \$9,700 per student) in tuition and fees through Alaska's membership in the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) and participation in the Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE);
- Through WUE, facilitated attendance of 396 nonresident, undergraduate students at the University of Alaska;
- Enabled 19 Alaska students to take advantage of preferred admission into select professional education programs not available in Alaska, including dentistry, through participation in the WICHE professional student exchange program;
- Maintained an updated, mobile-friendly agency website, resulting in reduced maintenance costs;
- Awarded \$10,160.0 in Alaska Performance Scholarships (APS) and \$5,858.9 in Alaska Education Grants (AEG);
- The Alaska Student Aid Portal (ASAP), functioning as the financial aid management tool for participating postsecondary institutions for online certification of student enrollment and continuing eligibility, enabled paperless aid disbursement through schools to participating APS and AEG students;
- Produced the 2019 APS Outcomes Report on the first eight high school graduate cohorts, documenting significant positive program impacts, specifically that APS students take more credits and need less remediation, persist in their studies, and stay in Alaska at higher rates, compared to their non-APS peers;
- Focused on using customer feedback to prioritize servicing enhancements and efficiencies, implementing changes that result in increased customer satisfaction and reduced processing and servicing costs;
- Implemented regular customer surveys and used the results to inform decisions and programs;
- As part of ACPE's overall Lean initiative, conducted a cross-functional Kaizen event to identify areas for improvement related to the loan application processing function, and implemented multiple improvements

- resulting in efficiencies for staff and a more streamlined process for students;
- Continued implementation of Lean as a model of continuous improvement, resulting in incremental line staff-level efficiencies with an estimated value of \$56,000 in FY19;
- Further expanded use of email and other electronic communications to reduce costs of communicating with customers;
- Continued work restructuring, automation, outsourcing and other options to allow for ongoing reductions in positions;
- Delivered Alaska Career Information System (AKCIS) support and training to teachers/counselors statewide.
 AKCIS has 377 active sites and is used in all 53 school districts, with 13,334 new portfolios created and user activity at approximately 92,000 logins in FY2019 relating to Personal Learning and Career Plans;
- Disseminated APS information to increase public awareness through: 67 events (including distance-based), reaching a total of 4,969 individuals statewide; the APS.alaska.gov website; self-service resources and tools such as the APS Eligibility Progress and Initial Award/Continuing Eligibility Checklists; and direct mail information to high school seniors;
- Provided postsecondary planning information to 13,702 educators, students, and families at 335 events in 82 communities across all regions of the state, both in-person and via distance delivery;
- Through partnerships with the Alaska Postsecondary Access & Completion (APAC) Network a cross-sector and statewide group of Alaska leaders developed at ACPE and spun off as an independent, privately funded non-profit facilitated partnership, communication of the value of Alaskans' postsecondary attainment. The Network, which has set a postsecondary attainment goal of 65% of working-age Alaskans with postsecondary credentials by 2025, secured private outside funding to establish a data dashboard of interim metrics to track progress towards the goal; adopted a formal definition of the term "credential"; and hosted the fifth annual "Alaska Can!" conference attended by more than 120 postsecondary access and success professionals;
- Maintained the Alaska College & Career Advising Consortium as a low-cost, partnership-based structure to
 ensure services previously provided by grant-funded positions remain available post-grant, without additional
 cost to the state. The Consortium provides training on college & career advising to employees of partner
 entities including Native organizations, school districts, and postsecondary institutions; and facilitates
 participation in statewide initiatives promoting activities proven to increase postsecondary enrollment, such as
 FAFSA completion;
- Served as Alaska's State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) portal agency, thereby 1) providing
 Alaska's higher education institutions with a low-cost option to deliver their distance education programs in
 any other SARA participant state without the need to meet state-by-state requirements; and 2) increasing
 Alaskans' opportunity to more readily access distance education programs originating from out-of-state
 institutions located in other SARA participating states;
- In FY2019, 5,918 Alaska students enrolled in SARA participating distance education programs, and facilitated attendance of 430 nonresidents participation in Alaska-based distance education programs
- Provided all outreach and early services and operated the Alaska's scholarship, need-based grant, and WWAMI programs at no cost to the state's General Fund; and
- In program year 2019, implemented significant changes to the in-school, family and refinance loans. Changes included tiered interest rates, providing lower interest rates to the most creditworthy borrowers and cosigners, and introducing a credit builder loan for borrowers and cosigners with lower credit scores and an absence of derogatory credit information. Also offered lower interest rates for students attending schools in Alaska as a pilot to incentivize and reward Alaska attendance.

Key Component Challenges

- Lack of low-cost methods of direct communication to Alaska high school students and families, to ensure receipt of Alaska Performance Scholarship and the Alaska Education Grant information;
- Ensuring Alaskans' current and informed perceptions about career/workforce readiness to result in increased high school graduation rates—particularly among low-income residents;
- Creating a sense of urgency regarding the looming shortfall of Alaskans prepared to fill Alaska jobs as we further develop our resources;
- Longstanding pattern of Alaska's students' low engagement levels with their postsecondary education programs which results in high attrition and low educational attainment rates;
- Maintaining the Alaska Student Loan Corporation (ASLC) lending economies of scale necessary to fund non-loan operating activities;
- Growing misperception that student loans are inherently bad;

- Lack of ability to ensure Alaska education loan borrowers are informed by their schools about the state's low-cost loan programs; and
- Lack of ability to produce cross-sector outcomes reports to identify which programs are most successful at resulting in postsecondary access and completion, and in increased ability to participate successfully in the Alaska workforce.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Outsourcing servicing of legacy Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFELP), expected to result in ongoing annual savings of \$1 million, achieved primarily through PCN reductions
- Updated loan application process, with streamlined online processes and on-demand, mobile-friendly online account access for borrowers;
- Ongoing expanded use of email and other electronic communications to reduce costs of communicating with customers;
- Streamlined institutional authorization processes, and associated regulations changes;
- Expanded Lean activities, including introduction of staff career development pathways; and
- Implementation of updates to loan servicing system to streamline processes and reduce costs of servicing.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- The first cohort under the new curriculum graduated in May 2019; Alaska medical students now spend the equivalent of the first and second year of medical school at the University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA), and may complete most of their clinical training years in Alaska;
- Successful development of additional Targeted Rural and Underserved Track (TRUST) program in Soldotna; two TRUST students admitted in E18 and four WWAMI Rural Integrated Training Experience (WRITE) students participated in the 2018-2019 school year. Ketchikan had their first student complete the TRUST scholar program entirely (two years as at TRUST student followed by six months as a WRITE student at the site) and graduated in 2019;
- Hosted the twelfth annual UAA WWAMI PreMed Summit with over 150 participants;
- Continued to provide opportunities to high school students, with a special emphasis on underrepresented
 minorities to ensure new pipeline programs for the encouragement of medical education. Opportunities
 include: HEART = Health Education and Awareness through Role modeling and Teaching has expanded and
 students are actively reaching out to High schools, have attended UAA Expo and Stem days, went to the
 AIMES conference in Fairbanks this year, faculty attended the UAA Preview day for the College of Health,
 students presented at the Annual HOSA conference in Anchorage in March;
- The Alaska Pediatric Track has had five cohorts graduate and has a retention rate of 45%, with nine out of 20 graduates *currently* practicing in Alaska. One resident in the 2020 class has already signed a contract with Bethel;
- The Alaska Family Medicine Residency has been training physicians for twenty-two years. The residency trains 12 residents per year, with over 200 graduates and 77% practicing in Alaska and 50% of those practicing in rural communities;

- Development work on the Alaska Internal Medicine Residency Track continues and multiple funding sources
 are being explored. The plan is to pursue a Rural Training Track model in which residents complete their first
 year of training in Seattle and their second and third years of training in Alaska. The mission of the track
 remains to provide an Alaska-based outpatient general internal medicine/primary care training experience
 with the ultimate goal of recruiting and retaining high-quality internists to practice in the state;
- Collaborated in inter-professional training including medical students, physician assistant students, nursing students, pharmacy students, occupational therapy students, and speech therapy students;
- Faculty development efforts continued and conferences included on-site trainings in communities outside of Anchorage. Expanding and growing faculty development opportunities for clinical faculty statewide continues;
- Expanded the WRITE clinical training to include Advanced Patient Care and, in some sites, OB/Gyn; and
- The Rural Underserved Opportunities Program (RUOP) was successfully absorbed by Alaska WWAMI from the Anchorage AHEC office. Summer experiences were hosted across Alaska, with a total of nine students participating in 9 different rural or underserved settings. 2019 RUOP sites included: Anchorage (Mt. View Clinic), Bethel, Fairbanks, Homer, Juneau, Ketchikan, Naknek, Nome, Soldotna and Seattle (Spanish-Underserved).

Key Component Challenges

To continue to provide Alaskans guaranteed access to medical education and to address statewide professional medical workforce needs.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Expand the TRUST/ WRITE clinical training to include OB/Gyn and APC at qualified sites;
- Create new APC/AOC required clerkships sites across Alaska;
- Continue to increase the number of site-specific longitudinal clinical training opportunities for third- and fourth-year medical students: Identify and develop additional WRITE sites in Valdez, Bethel and Nome;
- Continue to establish clerkship sites in Matanuska Valley with goal to develop second Track site;
- Finalize the development of the Internal Medicine Residency Alaska Track;
- Develop clerkships for the Underserved Pathway at the Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center;
- Partner with AHEC to expand RUOP to include AHEC Scholars. Currently exploring ways to incorporate AHEC Scholars into the Foundation Phase curriculum thru RUOP & Primary Care Practicum for interested students;
- Continue to conduct advanced faculty development workshops emphasizing clinical education and the Foundation Phase. Expand the number of trainings, topics and locations provided annually;
- Post-Baccalaureate Certificate Program currently in process of development and curriculum approval with goal start date of Fall 2020; and
- Continue to expand exposure medical education for high school students through zoom and other
 opportunities.

Contribution to Department's Mission

The Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) is a performance-based scholarship that is effectively raising the collective academic achievement of Alaska's students. Central to the program are the eligibility requirements that students 1) engage in a rigorous secondary education program of study; and 2) perform well on standards-based, college or career readiness assessments.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- Awarded \$11,500.0 in Alaska Performance Scholarships (APS) and \$5,750.0 in Alaska Education Grants (AEG);
- Enhanced the Alaska Student Aid Portal (ASAP), a web-based financial aid management system, ACPE used to provide eligible Alaskans with information about their individual APS and/or AEG accounts, and with the ability to provide online updates;
- ASAP, functioning as the financial aid management tool for participating postsecondary institutions for online certification of student enrollment and continuing eligibility, enabled paperless aid disbursement through schools to participating students, and was used to deliver approximately \$11.1 million to just under 3,400 APS recipients and \$5.9 million to over 2,500 AEG recipients; and
- Produced the 2018 APS Outcomes Report on the first seven high school graduate cohorts, documenting significant positive program impacts specifically that APS students take more credits and need less remediation, persist in their studies, and stay in Alaska at higher rates, compared to their non-APS peers.

Key Component Challenges

- Lack of data sharing prevents early outreach to high school juniors about potential APS eligibility and importance of staying on track;
- Effecting a statewide culture that values higher education and understands the importance of taking a rigorous high school curriculum; and
- Continuing to utilize technology and self-service outreach and application tools to reduce staffing needs and associated costs of outreach.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Ongoing expanded use of email and other electronic communications to reduce costs of communicating with customers:
- Further streamlining of APS outcomes reporting protocols to reduce costs of reporting;
- Further improvements to ASAP to provide streamlined processing and reduce the need for costly manual processing; and
- Updated education programs for teachers, counselors and other mentors assisting students with becoming APS-eligible.

RDU/Component: Loan Servicing

Contribution to Department's Mission

Alaska Student Loan Corporation's mission is to operate as an enterprise agency of the State of Alaska thereby funding and facilitating the work of the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education to promote access to and success in education and career training beyond high school for Alaskans.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2019

- The Alaska Student Loan Corporation (ASLC) continued to fund low-cost education loans to assist Alaska students with the financing of their postsecondary education;
- ASLC continued to meet all of it fiscal responsibilities including substantially absorbing the administrative costs of Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education's programs and services without reliance on state general fund monies;
- Refined the Alaska Education Loan Refinancing Program (Refi), offering Alaska residents the opportunity to refinance all their education loan debt, regardless of lender, at reduced cost, with the long-term goal of achieving servicing savings sufficient to reduce costs for new student borrowers;
- ASLC made the pilot Refi program permanent, with an FY18 interest rate of 4.95%;
- In program year 2019, implemented significant changes to the in-school, family and Refi loans. Changes included tiered interest rates, providing lower interest rates to the most creditworthy borrowers and cosigners, and introducing a credit builder loan for borrowers and cosigners with lower credit scores and an absence of derogatory credit information. Also offered lower interest rates for students attending schools in Alaska to incentivize and reward Alaska attendance; and
- Met annual loan demand without the issuance of new debt.

Key Component Challenges

- Within the current financial market context ASLC is and will continue to face difficulties in achieving low- cost financing such that it will be possible to significantly reduce education loan interest rates while also making loans available to a broader segment of Alaska's student population;
- The drop in loan volume since 2008 is resulting in a declining loan portfolio. Given the fixed costs associated
 with high quality loan servicing, this portfolio runoff is eroding administrative efficiency of scale and impairing
 ASLC's ability to keep education loan interest costs low;
- Efficiently servicing the legacy FFELP portfolio in light of ongoing federal changes to the program;
- Failure of Alaska postsecondary institutions to make Alaska students aware of the benefits of state education loans, resulting in over half of Alaska's students borrowing from considerably more expensive but high name-recognition private lenders; and
- Refuting growing national mythology that student loans are inherently bad investments.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2021

- Further expand Refi program to attract new volume and reduce ASLC servicing costs, especially at the high FICO ranges;
- Continue to responsibly increase loan volume through interest rate reductions and tiered credit requirements;
- Expand and streamline on-demand, mobile-friendly online account access for borrowers and for the increasing number of cosigners;
- Exploring contractual FFELP servicing options to reduce costs while maintaining quality, and
- Expand use of email and other electronic communications to reduce costs of communicating with customers.
