Guidance provided by the U.S. Department of Labor advises that the payment of the PCORI fee does not constitute a permissible expense of the health plan for purposes of Title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA).</p> <p>Under the original Affordable Care Act, the final PCORI payment was due July 31, 2019, new legislation extends this fee for additional 10 years.</p> <p>The new fee has not yet been published, in the past the fee has been progressive, our current estimate is \$2.60 per covered life for FY2021. The total fee is calculated using the average number of covered lives (retirees and dependents) of the retiree health plan as the basis for determining the annual amount. This new contract includes a multi-year increase in administrative fees and a projected increase in membership over the life of the contract.</p> <p>This increase will fully fund the medical, dental, vision, and audio third-party claims administrator for the AlaskaCare employee and retiree health and dental plans. These plans provide coverage for an estimated 88,000 policies with a combined annual claim spend of over \$700 million (excluding pharmacy and long-term care benefits).</p> <p>The total cost of the TPA contract includes both the administrative fees and the discounts each vendor can provide to reduce the \$700 million annual claim spend. This combined total represents the financial impact to the health plans, and it is not unprecedented for a vendor to have higher administrative fees but provide significant discounts resulting in an overall net savings to the plans.</p>

To date, debt has been transferred to SSoA from the Department of Law, the Department of Labor, and the Department of Revenue, Permanent Fund Dividend Division. SSoA has reinvigorated the discussions with departments to begin the process of analyzing and transferring additional state debt to the SSoA collections unit to manage via a vendor.</p> <p>In addition, the division is adding new statewide contracts and has begun marketing these to bring in additional revenue. Public guardians serve adult Trust beneficiaries found to be incapacitated by the Superior court. Public guardians are required to maintain benefits, manage finances, make medical decisions, and ensure suitable housing for each Trust beneficiary. Assisting Trust beneficiaries with these needs improves public protection and state resource management by giving them the ability to live safely in their communities rather than in state hospitals or even correctional institutions. This position supports the Office of Public Advocacy's strategic plan to reduce the current public guardian caseloads from approximately 100 cases per public guardian to the recommended national maximum of 40 cases per public guardian, resulting in improved services, supports, and overall management of Trust beneficiaries.</p>
