Major Component Accomplishments in 2020

Value of Subsistence Harvest to Alaska's Residents

Subsistence uses of fish and wildlife are given a priority over commercial fishing and recreational and personal use fishing and hunting in state and federal law. This means that when the harvestable portion of a fish stock or game population is not sufficient for all public uses, subsistence uses are restricted last by regulation. Under state

regulations all Alaskans have a subsistence priority irrespective of where they live. Under federal regulations only rural residents who are deemed to be federally qualified have a subsistence priority. This conflict in eligibility results in differential application of state and federal subsistence laws and resultant regulations and policies.

While access by non-federally qualified individuals to some fisheries and hunts has been restricted, by and large, fishers and hunters living in nonsubsistence areas have not experienced major changes in harvest opportunities due to the subsistence priority. General hunting and sport fishing regulations continue to provide opportunities for all Alaska residents and nonresidents. Personal use net fisheries provide for established food fisheries of urban residents in areas closed to subsistence fishing. State subsistence fisheries and hunts are open to all Alaskans regardless of residence.

The subsistence food harvest by Alaska residents (about 33.6 million pounds in 2017, excluding wild plants) represents about 0.9 percent of the fish and game harvested annually in Alaska. This total includes all noncommercial harvests by residents of rural areas plus harvests taken under subsistence fishing and hunting regulations by residents of nonsubsistence areas. Personal use fishing, and hunting under general regulations by Alaskans produce an additional 0.2 percent of all harvests. Sport fishing and hunting (sport fishing by Alaskans and nonresidents and all nonresident hunting) take 0.3 percent. Commercial fisheries account for the balance about 98.6 percent of the statewide harvest. Though relatively small in the statewide picture, subsistence fishing, hunting, and gathering provide a major part of the food supply of rural Alaska. The section's best estimate is about 34.0 million pounds (usable weight) of wild foods are harvested annually by residents of rural areas of the state, and 11.4 million pounds by urban residents in all noncommercial fisheries and hunts. On a per person basis, the annual wild food harvest is about 276 pounds per person per year for residents of rural areas (about 0.75 pounds a day per person), and 19 pounds per person per year for urban areas.

Subsistence fishing and hunting are a principal characteristic of the rural Alaska economy. Attaching a dollar value to wild food harvest is difficult, because subsistence products do not circulate in markets. However, if families did not have subsistence foods, substitutes would have to be purchased. If one assumes a replacement expense of

\$5.00–\$10.00 per pound, the simple "replacement value" of the wild food harvests of communities outside nonsubsistence areas may be estimated at \$170–\$340 million annually, and at \$227–\$454 million for all Alaska communities. Outside Alaska's nonsubsistence areas, subsistence is part of an economic system called a "mixed, subsistence-market" economy. Families invest money into small-scale, efficient technologies to harvest wild foods, such as fish wheels, gillnets, motorized skiffs, and snowmachines. Subsistence food production is directed toward meeting the self-limited needs of families and small communities, and not toward market sale or accumulated profit as in commercial market production. Families follow a prudent economic strategy of using a portion of the household monetary earnings to capitalize in subsistence technologies for producing food. This combination of money from paid employment and subsistence food production is what characterizes the mixed, subsistence market economies outside nonsubsistence areas. Successful families in these areas combine jobs with subsistence activities and share wild food harvests with cash-poor households who cannot fish or hunt, such as elders, the disabled, and single parents with small children.

Reports and Data Completed

The primary goal of this section is to scientifically gather, quantify, evaluate, and report information about customary and traditional uses of Alaska's fish and wildlife resources. (*AS 16.05.094*) This information is used to inform decisions by regulatory bodies to ensure decisions are based on best available information. In FY2020, the onset of the global COVID-19 pandemic, and subsequent restrictions and closures imposed to protect public health and safety during the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic significantly affected the section's normal research activities. Reports and data graphs reflect the loss of data collection.

The section's research program continues to be a key component of the department's efforts to understand declining Chinook and sockeye salmon runs and the implications to subsistence users and uses of this resource.

Fish and Game Boards Support

The Board of Fisheries, Board of Game, and Joint Board of Fisheries and Game continued to consider information provided by the section as they deliberated on proposals for changes in hunting and fishing regulations. The section reviewed 470 proposals, emergency and subsistence petitions, and agenda change requests; and provided information to the boards on customary and traditional uses, and for making

determinations of amounts of fish and wildlife reasonably necessary for subsistence uses in several areas of the state. The Board of Fisheries acted on subsistence proposals primarily for the Lower and Upper Cook Inlet and Kodiak management areas, as well as statewide king and Tanner crab. The Board of Game addressed subsistence harvests and uses Tier II hunts in the Western/Arctic and Interior and Eastern Arctic regions. In addition, the Board of Game held two special meetings to address spring bear hunting opportunities affected by restrictions and closures imposed to protect public health and safety during the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic. There was no Joint Boards of Fisheries and Game meeting in FY2020.

Special Assignments

The section provided information and analysis of subsistence information as follows:

- 1. To the Federal Subsistence Board in providing the State of Alaska analysis and recommendations for proposals affecting subsistence uses of fish and wildlife on federal public lands.
- 2. To the North Pacific Fishery Management Council and the International Pacific Halibut Commission on uses of halibut for subsistence as part of their review and consideration of changes to subsistence halibut fishing regulations.
- 3. To the Alaska Migratory Bird Co-Management Council on subsistence bird hunting and harvest estimation as part of their consideration of hunting regulations and harvest monitoring programs in different regions of the state. The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service transferred the coordination of the council's harvest assessment program to the section on the Steering Committee and the Scientific Technical Committee.
- 4. To the Kuskokwim Salmon Management Working Group, the Kuskokwim Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.
- 5. To the Yukon River Panel. The Northern Region Program Manager serves as alternate co-chair of the U.S.-Canada Yukon River Panel, which is charged with implementing provisions and obligations of the Pacific Salmon Treaty with Canada. Other division staff participate as members of the scientific Joint Technical Committee of the Yukon Panel. The division also has a lead role with the Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim Sustainable Salmon Initiative.

Key Component Challenges

Two of the section's goals are to continue collecting information representative of communities and regions of the state, and to provide the public with updated information and analysis of subsistence harvests and uses. In addition to restrictions and closures imposed to protect public health and safety during the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, higher costs and reduced grant funds make these challenging goals to achieve, due to managing obligations from grant funding sources other than state general funds.

Acquisition of Customary and Traditional Harvest and Use Information

To the extent that funds are available and community pandemic mitigation measures are adopted, the section will continue annual harvest monitoring for state subsistence salmon fisheries for key areas where harvest information is essential for management and regulatory decisions. Harvest data are maintained in separate databases by several divisions; subsistence harvest and use data are not compiled and analyzed in a comprehensive fashion to present to regulatory boards, policymakers, and the public.

The section will prioritize funds to ensure that essential scientific information is provided to the public, the Board of Fisheries, Board of Game, fish and game managers, local fish and game advisory committees, Federal Subsistence Board, and inter-tribal commissions for regulation and management of fish and wildlife for subsistence uses, consistent with state law and the sustained yield principle.

The section will continue to serve the public from the Bethel field office through seasonal relocation, as well as in Douglas, Anchorage, and Fairbanks, in order to obtain local ecological knowledge and traditional knowledge.

Information Management, Analysis, and Dissemination

The division will continue analyzing customary and traditional harvest and use information as it is acquired. Given fiscal and pandemic constraints, on demand analyses and presentations of comprehensive subsistence harvest information are not part of annual operations and require reprogramming of staff and funding from other

core services to address issues as requested by boards and policymaking bodies. Constraints in meeting these short notice requests are occurring.

Contingent on available funding and pandemic mitigation measures, the section will continue to analyze the impacts of, and provide information for, subsistence resource issues that may require regulatory actions due to shifting climates and food security. This includes continuing to coordinate efforts with other departments and agencies to assist in potential regulatory responses in their arenas as necessary.

The section continues to assist the Board of Game and Board of Fisheries as they further refine customary and traditional subsistence uses of Alaska's fish and wildlife, which includes updates to amounts reasonably necessary for subsistence (ANS) findings, especially for species with management concerns or allocation issues.

The section continues to contribute to the department's review and analysis of legal challenges, state and federal court cases, legislation, Endangered Species Act (ESA) listings, and Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) filings affecting customary and traditional uses of fish and wildlife resources by all Alaskans. This is an essential service, and the section has reprogrammed staff and funding from core services in order to provide a rapid response to data requests.

Significant Changes in Results to be Delivered in FY2022

The section anticipates the delivery of significant updates to research results on subsistence uses of Alaska's fish and wildlife, such as the Western Arctic Caribou Herd, from partnering with other divisions as well as partnership projects with other state and federal agencies.
