**Brief Summary and Statement of Need:**

The City of Dillingham relies on an aerated wastewater treatment lagoon system, constructed in 1989, which discharges an average of 150,000 gallons a day of treated domestic wastewater into the Nushagak River. According to the 2018 City Shoreline Emergency Bank Stabilization Environmental Assessment by the Army Corps, the Nushagak estuary shoreline is “highly erosive,” with an erosion rate of 11-12 feet per year. The City of Dillingham is requesting funds to construct the necessary shoreline protection to avert the impending failure of the City of Dillingham’s sewage lagoon.
